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WASHINGTON COMMENT.

The currency bill has passed the senate by a vote of 46 to 29, the other members of the senate being paired on opposing sides. The democrats offered a number of amendments, all of which were defeated by about the same vote. The most serious struggle of the day was on the adoption of the miserable evasion offered by the finance committee declaring that nothing in the bill should be construed to prevent the adoption of bimetallism by international consent. This clause was inserted in order to permit Senator Wolcott to vote for the bill without going back on all his expressed convictions and to enable him to retain the fond delusion that he still stands a chance of re-election next year. The bill now goes to a conference committee of the senate and house, where it is believed that the differences between the two bills will speedily be harmonized by the cohesive force of public plunder.

The democrats have good cause to rejoice. It is now fairly evident that they have defeated the three great administration measures-the Porto Rican tariff, the Hanna ship subsidy and the Hay-Paunceforte treaty. The first named will probably be beaten despite the fact that the president has abandoned his declared position in favor of free trade with Porto Rico on the ground that he is obliged to do so in order to secure the passage of any Porto Rican bill by the house and senate. He expresses his solicitude for the people of that island and says that half a loaf is better for

them than no bread. No president ever made a more abject surrender than Mr. McKinley has made on the Porto Rican tariff bill, now before the house. He stated positively in his annual message that he favored free trade for Porto Rico, and when the republicans in the house first talked about putting a duty on Porto Rican products, he even went so far as to intimate to democrats he met that he would be glad if they would help defeat the proposed duty. Now, he has turned a complete somersault, and announced, in advance of its passage, that he would sign the bill imposing a 25 per cent duty. No wonder republicans in congress laugh when Mr. McKinley is spoken of as their
