EDITORIAL.

GERMANS AND IMPERIALISM.

While the Republican National convention was in session in Philadelphia the Turner's Bund held a great gathering in that city, which was representative of German sentiment throughout the country. The Bund, on the day the Republican convention adopted a platform reeking with imperialism and militarism sounded a grandly discordant note by adopting by a unanimous vote a resolution protesting against an imperialistic policy and denouncing the war McKinley is waging in the Philippines. The pith of these resolutions is as follows :

We recognize the right of all people to defend with arms of warfare their liberty and independence. We consider every attempt through the methods of war, of territorial expansion, as opposed to civilization and as an act of brute force.

We condemn every effort to extend the blessings of civilization with sword and gun as one based upon hypocracy and greed for gain.

We protest against the policy of con-quest of this Government, and against every attempt toward expanding the domain of the United States by force.

The Turner's Bund in this action represents the principles and convictions of nine-tenths of the German population of the United States. This has been abundantly demonstrated by other facts. The Bund is not a political organization, but is widely representative of German sentiment, and opposing imperialism is not politics but patriotism. 
