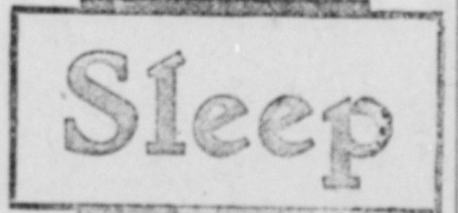
Linn-Barber.
