

M'KINLEY AGAIN

Four Years More of Republican Control at Washington.

THE VERDICT OF THE PEOPLE

It Increases the Electoral Votes For Republican Candidates.

DOUBTFUL STATES FOR M'KINLEY

New York, Ohio, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, West Virginia and Nebraska Help to Swell the Republican Electoral Vote, While Kansas, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming Transfer Their Allegiance—Pennsylvania Gives a Republican Plurality of 290,267.

The Republicans, in addition to re-electing President McKinley, have swept the country in the congressional elections, and will have, during the next two years, a working majority in both houses of the national legislature.

The latest returns show that McKinley will have 292 electoral votes. The figures give Bryan 155 electoral votes.

McKinley carried all the states he did in 1896 except Kentucky, and the

following states which were then in the Democratic column: Kansas, South Dakota, Nebraska, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

The New England States are solid for McKinley. The Middle states all vote for him. The south is probably unchanged from the vote of 1896. It is in the far west, therefore, that President McKinley has made his greatest gains.

New York Republicans rolled up a tremendous majority up the state. Be-

sides giving McKinley a majority of 143,822 in the state, they elected Odell and the full Republican state ticket.

Pennsylvania cast its usual tremendous vote for the national Republican nominees. The plurality for McKinley and Roosevelt is 290,267. The Republicans will have a big majority in both branches of the legislature.

DELAWARE REPUBLICAN.

The Legislature May Now Elect Two Republican Senators.

Wilmington, Nov. 8.—The Republicans not only carried the state for McKinley and Huns for governor, but also secured the legislature in both branches. This means the election of two Republican United States senators. The senate will be composed of nine Republicans and eight Democrats, and the house will have 19 Republicans and 15 Democrats, with one tie district, Red Lion hundred, which comprises the Twelfth representative district of New Castle county. On joint ballot the legislature will stand: Republicans, 28; Democrats, 23, not including the Red Lion hundred member. Inasmuch as the Republicans will be in control of the house of representatives, it is practically certain that Theodore F. Clark, the Republican candidate, and who was speaker of the last house, will be seated. The Republicans will have the organization of the senate and authority to pass upon the contest of Howard D. Ross, Republican, against Francis J. McNulty, Democrat, for senator.

The Republicans elected two senators and nine of the 15 representatives in Newcastle county. In Kent county the Democrats elected two senators, and each party elected five of the ten representatives. In Sussex county the Democrats elected one senator and the Republicans the other. The Democrats elected five and the Republicans five of the ten representatives.

The general assembly is Republican, but it was of the same complexion in 1895 and again in 1899, and both times senatorial deadlocks continued to the end. History may repeat itself.

THE RESULT IN NEBRASKA.

A Republican Elected Governor and McKinley's Plurality is 7,500.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 10.—With two counties to hear from, on the face of unofficial returns, Dietrich, Republican, is elected governor by a plurality of 675 over Governor Poynter. The rest of the state ticket is likely to be Republican, but it will take the official count to determine the result.

There is no change in the legislative situation, the result depending on Douglas county (Omaha), in which the official count proceeded only a little way today. County Clerk Haverly, Republican, endeavored to have a secret count made, but was forced by order of the district court, secured by the Democrats, to make it a public count. The Democrats are renewing their charges of fraud, and because of the concealment of ballots and his official conduct since election impeachment proceedings are said to be in preparation against Haverly. The Nebraska representative in congress is unchanged, four fusionists, two Populists and two Democrats and two Republicans, all of whom excepting Shallenberger, Democrat, in the Fifth district, who succeeded Sutherland, Populist, being re-elected.

McKinley's majority in Nebraska is 7,500.

CHAIRMAN COMBS SAYS FRAUD.

Is in Favor of Contesting the Vote For Presidential Electors.

Louisville, Nov. 10.—With unofficial returns from every precinct in Kentucky, The Courier Journal puts Bryan's majority at 7,635 and Beckham's at 4,110. The county boards canvassed the returns in 50 counties out of 119 from which official returns have been received did not materially change the majorities stated. There is no doubt that the full official returns will vary somewhat from the unofficial figures. It is hardly possible that majorities of 7,635 and 4,110 shall be wiped out, however, unless the unexpected shall happen.

Chairman Leslie Combs, of the Republican committee, said last night he is in favor of contesting the electoral vote of the state, not because Kentucky's vote is needed by the McKinley electors, but for precedent. He says that in Breathitt county frauds amounting to over 400 votes in favor of the Democrats have been discovered.

"If we allow this election to pass uncontested," said he, "we only foster more frauds for the future."

Mr. Combs says there will be no contest for governor, and he has never advised that the governorship should be contested.

Iowa's Congressman Republican.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 8.—It is apparent that Iowa is Republican by 100,000, and a solid delegation of 11 Republicans will be sent to Washington. Republican Chairman Weaver says: "Iowa is McKinley by over 100,000, and we have elected all the congressmen." Democratic Chairman Ruffman says: "We concede the state to McKinley by 50,000. We claim the election of Volmer in the Second congressional district."

The Election in Porto Rico.

San Juan, P. R., Nov. 9.—The official returns of Tuesday's election are nearly all at hand from the various part of the island. They show, as was anticipated and foreseen, the election by the Republicans of the entire house of delegates and of Senator Frederico Daguogo as commissioner to congress. Only 151 Federals went to the polls, the total Republican vote being about 58,000.

McKinley's Michigan Plurality.

Detroit, Nov. 8.—Latest returns give President McKinley a plurality of 90,858 and Col. A. T. Bliss, the Republican candidate for governor, 69,059. The Republicans have increased their majority in the legislature on joint ballot by seven. The entire Michigan congressional delegation is Republican.

Missouri's Republican Congressmen.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 8.—The Democrats have elected congressmen in 12 Missouri districts and the Republicans in two, with the Thirteenth and Fourteenth to be heard from. These are claimed by the Democrats.

Bryan's Colorado Plurality.

Denver, Nov. 8.—Returns from the election are slowly coming in, but sufficient returns and careful estimates have been received to show that Bryan's plurality will be from 30,000 to 35,000, and may reach 40,000.

New Mexico Republican.

Santa Fe, N. M., Nov. 8.—Indications are that B. S. Reed, Republican, has been elected delegate to congress. The legislature is Republican.

CONGRESSMEN CHOSEN.

Republicans Have a Good Majority in Both Branches.

FIVE SENATORS TO BE ELECTED.

Delaware and Nebraska Will Each Choose Two Members to the Upper House, While Idaho Will Select One Member to That Body.

Washington, Nov. 8.—The next senate, assuming that the state legislatures will fulfill their duty and choose senators to represent their states, will stand, on the basis of Tuesday's election, 49 Republicans, 27 Democrats and 9 Independents, with the legislatures in doubt in three states, with the privilege of electing five senators at this time. The legislatures in doubt are Delaware and Nebraska, in each of which states two senators are to be chosen, and Idaho, with one senatorial chair to be filled. Among those classed in the independent column are Senators Stewart, of Nevada, and Kyle, of South Dakota, who in the last congress acted with the Republicans on all party matters; Turner, of Washington, and Harris, of Kansas, who acted with the Democrats, and Wellington, of Maryland. The representation by states should be as follows:

According to a Chicago dispatch from Congressman Joseph W. Babcock, chairman of the Republican congressional committee, the Democrats have elected solid congressional delegations in Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, Nevada, South Carolina, Texas and Virginia, aggregating 75 members.

The Republicans have elected solid congressional delegations in California, Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming. Senator Clark's Re-election Assured.

Helena, Mont., Nov. 8.—Fuller returns of Tuesday's voting in this state confirm the preliminary estimates sent out. Bryan's plurality will be from 15,000 to 18,000, and Governor Toole leads the Democratic state ticket with 6,000 to 8,000 votes to spare. The legislature, which will elect two United States senators, is Democratic by from 15 to 20 votes on joint ballot, and will undoubtedly re-elect Senator Clark and some other Democrat or Populist to succeed Thomas C. Carter and fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Senator Clark last session.

Vermont's Republican Plurality.

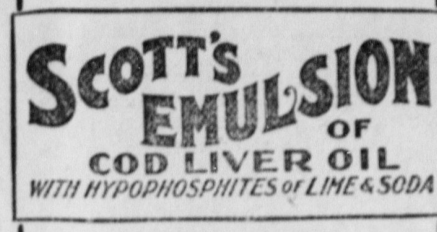
White River Junction, Vt., Nov. 8.—Returns from 175 towns with 71 more to hear from give McKinley 33,640, Bryan 10,592. This is a net gain of 29,440 per cent for Bryan and a net loss of 17 per cent for McKinley. Returns are coming very slowly. The missing towns are mainly in small agricultural towns, which are likely to increase the Republican plurality to about 30,000.

South Dakota's Legislature.

Sioix Falls, S. D., Nov. 8.—Republicans will elect from 105 to 115 members of the legislature out of a total of 132, giving them a majority in both branches. Republicans elect their two nominees for congress and full state ticket.
