Beth Low Elected Mayor of Greater

New York By Large Majority. New York, Nov. 6.-Seth Low, the former president of Columbia University, and four years ago the Citizens' Union candidate for the first mayor of Greater New York, was elected yesterday the second mayor of Greater New York by a plurality of 59,404, defeating Edward M. Shepard, of Brooklyn, the Democratic nominee. The campaign was an exciting one. and the vote, though somewhat less than the presidential election a year ago, was the largest ever polled in a municipal contest in this country.

In addition to the canvass for mayor public interest largely centered in the nomination by the Fusionists of William Travers Jerome for district attorney, and Mayor Robert A. Van Wyck by the Democrats for justice of of Centre.

The complete triumph of the Greater New York Fusion ticket was the election of Charles Vincent Fornes, the nominee of the Citizens' Union and the Republicans for president of the board of aldermen, defeating George M. Van Hoesen, the Demo-
