RECIPROCITY FOR CUBA

Ways and Means Committee Report Payne Bill Favorably.

WAS ADOPTED BY VOTE OF 12 TO 5

No Amendments to Reciprocity Feature Made, But Labor, Naturalization and Exclusion Laws Were Included. Sugar Men Will Fight.

Washington, April 1 .- The ways and means committee, by a vote of 12 to 5, yesterday ordered a favorable report on the Payne bill for 20 per cent. tariff concessions to Cuba. Eight Republicans voted for the bill. Two Republicans-Tawney, of Minensota, and Metcalf, of California, voted against it.

No amendments on the reciprocity feature were made, but by general consent the United States contract labor laws were included with the nattralization and exclusion laws as applicable to Cuba. A series of Democratic amendments for general tariff revision were defeated on strict party votes. Another series of amendments by McClellan (Dem.), of New York, changing the reciprocity rate to 50 per cent., 40 per cent., 33 1-3 per cent. and 25 per cent., were defeated successively, 2 to 13. An amendment by Mr. Tawney, striking out the differential on sugar, was ruled out by Chairman Payne as not germane, and on an appeal from the decision of the chair, the latter was sustained, 9 to 6.

The full strength on each side was present except Mr. Hopkins (Rep.), of Illinois, who was paired with Mr. Swanson, of Virginia.

Later in the day Mr. Payne presented the report to the house and announced that the bill will be called up a week from today.

Following the action of the committee the Republican members who oppose the Cuban reciprocity measure held a conference in the committee room of Representative William Alden Smith, of Michigan. About 30 members were present, representing the various states interested in beet sugar production. No formal action was taken, but the discussion was in the line of continuing the contest on the floor of the house. . It is expected that the opposition will be from members individually rather than from a compact and organized opposition. After the meeting it was claimed by those present that about 30 Republicans would speak and vote against the bill. The ways and means leaders feel confident that the bill will pass, probably by Republican votes. In any event, there is said to be more than sufficient Democratic support of the bill to offset the Republican defection.

MURDERED IN HIS CABIN

Woodchopper's Body Found Terribly Hacked By Sharp Instrument.

barre, Pa., March 31.-James Larkins, a woodchopper, living alone at Harvey's Lake, a summer resort near this city, was found dead in his cabin yesterday morning. Saturday night he had as his guest Samuel Keller. The two men drank considerable whiskey, and then, it is thought. started to fight. Some people living nearby heard screams coming from the cabin about midnight. Keller was covered with blood from several ugly cuts in the face.' Larkins was found lying on the floor of his cottage. He had been terribly hacked with some sharp instrument. Keller was at once arrested and brought to this city and lodged in the county jail. He denies all knowledge of the crime. The interior of the Larkin cabin resembled a slaughter house. A woodchopper's axe is missing. It is thought the men while in a drunken stupor engaged in a terrific battle, when the axe and table knives were used as weapons.

Killed In a Runaway.

Reading, Par, March 31-Two horses drawing a carriage containing four persons who were returning home from a Sunday school festival, ran away yesterday afternoon, and Mrs. Walter K. Lord, aged 45, a widow, becoming frightened, jumped from the carriage and was killed. The other occupants of the carriage escaped injury, though two of them, John Obold and his wife, were for a time rendered unconscious through ner Choctaw nation in the Indian territory, vous shock. Mr. Obold is a hardware dealer of this city.

Puddlers' Wages Increased.

Lebanon, Pa., April 1 .-- An increase of wages of 25 cents per ton has been granted the puddlers of the American Iron and Steel Manufacturing company, to take effect today. The puddlers asked for an increase of 50 cents per ton. The men are now receiving \$4 per ton but want \$4,50.

CHOONER SUNK IN COLLISION Edna Earl Goes Down in Delaware Bay

With Three of Crew. Philadelphia, March 31.-With the greater part of her crew of 11 men asleep in their bunks below deck, the little fishing schooner Edna Earl, bound for the sea, was run into and sunk in the Delaware bay, off Reedy Island, Del., late Saturday night, and three of her crew were drowned. The drowned men are William Smith, Dennis Ford, father-in-law of Smith, both of Philadelphia, and Patrick Nolan, of

The vessel that sunk the fisherman was the Norwegian steamship Romsdal, from New York for Philadelphia in ballast, which rescued the surviving members of the crew and brought them to this city. Who was at fault in causing the collision has not yet been determined. - Both Captain Hirsch, of the Romsdal, and Captain Kole, of the schooner, say that all their lights were burning and that they were completely within maritime regulations.

The sleeping fishermen were awak ened by the crash and rushed up the narrow companionway. All but three of them managed to reach the deck, Nolan, Smith and Ford being caught by the rush of water and were drowned inside the vessel. The blow struck by the Romsdal was so severe that the little schooner was almost cut in half and she sunk in less than five minutes. The surviving members took to the rigging, and in half an hour were taken off in a small boat sent to the rescue by Captain Hirsch, who immediately anchored his vessel after the collision. It took nearly a half hour for the Romsdal's crew to locate the wrecked sailors in the darkness.

KAISER'S YACHT DAMAGED

and Smashed Into a Pier. New York, April 1:- Meteor III., the yacht of the German emperor, was damaged while being towed clear of her berth at Shooter's Island for her trial spin yesterday. The tug A. A Sumner had a line on the Meteor and was pulling her out of the berth. The tug's steering gear suddenly gave way and the Meteor was left helpless. She had considerable headway and col lided with a pier in the basin off the dock. Her port rail was stove in and the large counter plate at her stern was badly dented. FILIPINO OFFERSTO SURRENDER Rufino, Who Spent \$30,000 to Incite

Rebellion, Tired of It. Manila, March 31.-Rufino, spent \$30,000 in his efforts to incite rebellion in the province of Misamis, Island of Mindanao, now declares he is tired of rebellion and has offered to surrender, with 75 rifles, to the native constabulary.

General Chaffee will leave Manila April 10 on a tour of inspection to the Island of Samar. He will visit every port in the island and will witness the surrender there, April 15, of the insurgent General Guevarra. After this surrender the American garrisons in Samar will be largely reduced.

Oppose Additional Vacation. Washington, April 1.-Nearly 300 per diem employes of the New York navy yard have joined in a protest against the passage of two house bills granting an additional 15 days' leave of absence to per diem employes of navy yards. The explanation of this apparently strange action on the part of the men is contained in a brief statement added to the protest. "We feel," say the men, "that if either of said bills is passed the chances for permanent employment for a great number of men will be decreased, owing to the increased cost of labor to the government. We are more than satisfied with the present allowance of 15 days leave."

Relief For Destitute Indians. Washington, April 1.-The attention of the secretary of the interior has been directed to the state of destitution and distress which exists among a large number of the citizens of the and in order to meet this conditions of affairs he has about decided to make a per capita distribution of the town site money belonging to these Indians, which is being held in trust by the government. This will give to each Indian a considerable sum.

He stuck to the train and tried to stop it. t jumped the track at a sharp curve. nd the engine and a score of cars were wrecked. The fireman, George Kreidler, escaped with slight injuries.
