CORONATION OF POPE PIUS X

Triple Crown Placed on His Head in Presence of 70,000 People.

SERVICES LASTED FIVE HOURS

When Crown Was Placed on Pontiff's Head Audience Burst Into Applause and Bells of Rome Rang Out Joyful Peal-Pope Pius Was Overcome and Had Scarcely Strength to Impart Apostolic Benedletion.

Rome, Aug. 9.-The ceremony of the coronation of Pope Pius X. took place in the Basilica of St. Peter's in the presence of the princes and high dignitaries of the church, diplomats

solemnity and splendor associated with this, the most magnificent rite in the Roman Catholic church.

As Cardinal Macchi, the dean of the cardinal-deacons, placed the triple KILLED BRIDE OF FOUR MONTHS crown on the head of the venerable pontiff, the throng of 70,000 persons gathered within the cathedral burst into unrestrained acclamations, the choir intoned a hymn of triumph, and the bells of Rome rang out a joyful

At 6 a. m. the ringing of bells announced the imminent opening of the doors, and a commotion at once began among the crowd. When the doors were opened the inrush was terrific, many who started from the bottom of the steps outside were lifted off their feet and carried into the cathedral. It was a great human torrent let loose, thousands of people rushing, crushing and sqeezing amid screams, protests, gesticulation and cries for help.

But once in the whirlpool, there was no escape, and the compactness of the crowd proved to be the safety of those caught in it. Women fainted in com paratively large number, and even men Frantz alleged that she was too intiwere overcome by the heat, but no mate with other men. Several times it serious accidents were reported. Fortunately there were very few children present. After their entrance the people had further long hours of waiting, and it is computed that the majority were on their feet altogether 10 hours, five before the ceremony and another five hours while it lasted.

On the appearance of the pontiff himself it seemed as though the people would seek to carry him in their erms, so great was their enthusiasm. Cries of 'Pius, our pope, our father," and "Long live Pius X.." were raised notwithstanding the large placards posted all over the basilica saying: "Acclamations are forbidden." Leaflets to the same effect were distributed among the crowds. The cries continued until the pontiff was compelled to rise and bless the multitude. and at the same time he made a sign for more reverential behavior. Silence was obtained when the choir announced its entrance with the resounding notes of the "Ecce Sacerdos Magnus," which were accompanied by the sweet notes of the silver

From the throne, Pius X., surrounded by his suite, walked to the high altar, standing over the crypt of St. Peter, into which meanwhile Cardinal Macchi descended to pray. The altar was surmounted by a baldachino supported by four historic bronze pillars taken from the Parthenon. The appearance of the pope in that elevated position called forth another burst of enthuslasm. The pope then blessed the altar, and after saying the "Indulgentiam," the maniple, a symbol of the cord with which Christ was bound on his capture, was placed with great ceremony upon the pope's arm. At the same time prayers for the coronation were recited by Cardinals Vannutelli, Mocenni, Agliardi and Satolli. Returning from the crypt, Cardinal Macehi placed upon the shoulders of the pope the pontifical pallium and attached it with three golden, jeweled pins, saying:

"Receive this sacred pallium as a symbol of the fulness of the pontifical office, in honor of Almighty God, the most glorious Virgin Mary, His mother, the blessed apostles, St. Peter and

olie church." and sonorous until it was even audible in the most distant corner of the immense church. Following this, Cardinal Macchi performed the rite of incensing the pope, whom he subse-quently kissed three times on the checks and chest, as did Cardinals Segna and Vannutelli. Upon the pope's return to the throne, the cardinals ofered their last obedience to the pon-in, kissing his hand and feet, and be-

ing embraced by him twice in turn. The bishops and archbishops kissed his foot and right knee, while the abbots kissed only his foot. The holy father then walked to the shrine of St. Peter's for the culminating rites of the extremely fatiguing ceremony. The whole sacred college gathered about the pope, singing Palestrina's "Corona Aurea Super Caput Ejus," while the choir burst forth into song. Cardinal Macchi then recited the

Pater Noster" and offered a prayer. Cardinal Deacon Segna then raised the pontiff's mitre and Senior Cardinal Deacon Macchi placed on the venerable white head the triple crown. At this moment the church was filled with the ringing of bells, the blowing of silver trumpets, the triumphant strains of the choir and the acclamations of the multitude which could no longer be repressed.

Pope Pius was quite overcome and had scarcely strength left to impart the apostolic benediction. Cardinals Macchi and Segna granted a plenary indulgence to all present and the procession then reformed and left the Baand Roman nobles, and with all the silica in the same form as it came.

The pope was visibly fatigued and his right hand shook as he raised it time after time to bestow his blessing. Cardinal Gibbons, after participating in the coronation ceremonies, started for the villa of the American College at Castel Gandolfe, accompanied by Monsignor Kennedy, the rector of the college, where he will spend a few days

PAPAL SECRETARY OF STATE It is Reported Cardinal Martinelli May be Appointed.

London, Aug. 11 .- The Chronicle's Rome correspondent says this morning that an authority which is frequently well informed says that Cardinal Sebastiano Martinelli will be appointed papal secretary of state,

(Cardinal Martinelli succeeded Cardinal Satolli as the pope's representative in this country in 1897, and remained here until he was recalled to Rome by the pope in May, 1903. He was given the red hat by Leo XIII in April, 1901.)

Lancaster Man Murdered His Wife In Her Sleep and Then Took Poison.

Lancaster, Pa., Aug. 10 ..- A bride of four months, Mrs. Edgar H. Frantz. aged 19 years, is dead, slain by her husband, a well-known young drug clerk of this city. Frantz died from the effects of morphine, which he swallowed, after firing two bullets into his wife. The woman was murdered in her sleep. Frantz left a note in which he said they had agreed to die together, but from the note and other facts it is believed Mrs. Frantz was the unsuspecting victim of her husband's jealousy. He was an excessive smoker of cigarettes.

The life of the young couple had been made unpleasant by quarrels ever since their marriage, Frantz being intensely jealous of his young wife. The latter was a strikingly beautiful woman, although she had a good reputation. is stated he threatened to kill her. She expected to leave today on a visit to the west with her mother. Frantz opposed this trip and there was much dickering about it.

Upon retiring they were apparently on the best of terms and in good spirits. An attempt to arouse them failed, and upon forcing the door Frantz's father found them lying on the bed, the woman clasped in her husband's arms. She was dead, with a bullet hole in her head and another through her breast. Frantz was still alive, but died several hours later,

Evidently Frantz had killed his wife while she was asleep, holding the weapon close to her body. The first shot must have caused instant death. There was not the slightest sign of a struggle and very little blood flowed from the wounds.

After satisfying himself that she was dead he deliberately walked around the bed to place the revolver on the washstand and it is believed then took the poison and after writing the note go back into bed and folded the woman he had murdered in what he meant to be his dying embrace.

Chambers, of Mount Holly, one of the best-known members of the bar of New Jersey, lost his life in the surf after having attempted to save the life of Mrs. Thacher, the wife of Dr. George F. Before he had gone far Mrs. Thacher called to him that she was safe, and that he need not come. Mr. Chambers, however, continued to swim out into the breakers while Mrs. Thacher got safely in shore. Suddenly Mr. Chambers was seen to sink from sight After some time a lifeboat was launched and the body of the lawyer was taken from the surf.
