Drop in Mercury. Nineteen degrees below zero, that was the reading of the government thermometer at Bellefonte, on Tuesday morning at 3 o'clock. That beats the record for these parts we think. Some instruments read 24 degrees below zero, locality in town accounting for the variation. From all parts of the county we hear of about the same range. At 8 o'clock in the morning, Snow Shoe reported mercury down to 20 below zero, which must have been a rise of three or four degrees since 3 o'clock in the morning the hour when all thermometers read lowest as a general rule. Coburn at 7 o'clock reported mercury at 28 below zero. At Millheim at 7 o'clock mercury was 24 below. At Spring Mills at 6 o'clock mercury was 26 below zero. At Glen Iron it was 28 below. Pleasant Gap, at 8 o'clock, 24 below zero. At Piedler, in Haines twp., at 5:30, 24 below zero. At Millheim, in 1872, January 5, the thermometer showed 32 degrees below zero. In 1872, about same time as above, the self-registering thermometer of Jacob Thomas, of Bellefonte, showed 33 degrees below zero.

The lowest point reached at Warriorsmark was 30. At Clearfield 30 was also reached; at Philipsburg a lower point was reached, but at Huntingdon Furnace the greatest record was made, showing 34 dg. below zero. Tyrone 20 below.

Leap Year. After eight long years we have another leap year, 1904 being on the calendar as such. The year 1900, as has often been explained, was not a leap year. According to the Gregorian calendar, every year, divisible by four, without a remainder, is a leap year, except it be the last one in a century, and then it is a leap year, divisible by 400 without a remainder. As 1900 was not divisible without a remainder it was not a leap year.
