Legislative.

Would Annex Panama.

A new factor in the Panama treaty equation before the senate appeared, causing surprise on both sides, when the venerable Mr. Morgan of Alabama, Democrat, who has fought the treaty and the Panama route all along, introduced a bill designed to recognize the independence of Panama and its annexation by the United States for the construction of a waterway.

A Democratic caucus early in the week showed that there was little hope of Mr. Gorman's having a solid minority against the treaty. Several southern senators decided to obey home instructions for the treaty, while others held out in spite of opposition at home.

Pure Food Bill Passed.

The Hepburn pure food bill was adopted by the house, Jan. 20, by the overwhelming vote of 291 to 65, substantially as it came from the committee.

Williams on "Stand Pat."

The house minority leader, Mr. Williams, took up the Hanna phrase "stand pat" in connection with a speech on the tariff, in which he said that coal had been 67 cents cheaper during the year that tariff was repealed.

Executive.

Manchurian Consuls Named.

President Roosevelt sent to the senate Tuesday the nominations of Fleming D. Cheshire to be consul general at Mukden, Manchuria; Edwin V. Morgan to be consul at Dainy, Manchuria, and James W. Davidson to be consul at Antung, China.

Smithson's Body Arrives.

The remains of James Smithson, founder of the Smithsonian Institution at Washington, who died and was buried at Genoa, Italy, in 1829, reached New York Thursday on the steamer Princess Irene, accompanied by Professor Alexander Graham Bell.

Armor Collision Denied.

In reply to the inquiries of the house committee on naval affairs concerning the Schwab charges of collusion between the government and the Carnegie and Bethlehem steel plants in regard to armor plate contracts, the rear admiral of the ordnance department denies specifically that such collusion existed.

Legal and Criminal.

Theaters Closed For Season.

The city council of Chicago took action resulting in the closing of nearly every theater in the city for the rest of the season. The ordinance requires a steel curtain, automatic sprinkling system, widening of exits and a \$25,000 bond guaranteeing further improvements before Aug. 1, 1904.

The Machen Trial.

The trial of August Machen and others for conspiracy to defraud the post-office department continued at Washington, and the interesting fact was brought out by the government that Machen made \$20,000 a year out of his office.

Supreme Court Decisions.

In the case of an Alabama negro named Rogers, who was indicted for murder by a jury from which negroes had been excluded because of their

color, the United States supreme court on Monday reaffirmed the decision in the case of Carter versus the state of Texas, declaring the exclusion of negroes from grand juries in cases involving criminal charges against members of their race unconstitutional.

The same day the court decided that the shareholders, and not the directors, of a bank shall decide whether an assessment of stock shall be made when the comptroller of the currency gives notice that the capital stock is impaired. The case was that of Henry Weinhard and G. H. Williams versus the Commercial National bank of Portland, Ore.

Criminal Notes.

The trial of the Bechtels as accessory to the murder of Mabel Bechtel continued at Allentown, Pa. The mother was the chief witness for defense. She said that she had never laid a hand on her daughter and that her son Tom had not quarreled with the girl. Blood experts testified pro and con about the stains found in the Bechtel home.

Foreign.

Serious Hottentot Revolt.

On reports of a widespread uprising in German Southwest Africa a body of marines started from Germany Jan. 20 as reinforcements to the colonial authorities. This course was authorized by the reichstag, it being shown that the native Hereros had been murdering the settlers and attacking the colonial troops at a time when the government was away with most of its forces subduing another tribe.

British Free Trade Victory.

In the Norwich bye-elections, Jan. 16, the free traders were victorious in the election of the Liberal candidate Tillott on a large plurality. This is the first defeat for Chamberlain in the recent series of bye-elections.

Fearful Trouble at Seoul.

The danger point in the east shifted to the Korean capital, Seoul, last week, on account of the weakness of the government there in presence of a growing anti-foreign sentiment among troops and fanatics. This feeling was fomented by Russian intrigue. The American minister, Mr. Allen, cabled Washington to send another ship and land more marines. This was promptly ordered, and Americans at Seoul breathed easier.

The impression was gaining ground that Russia's reply would make sufficient concessions in the Korean sphere to form a peace basis when it was reported, Jan. 23, that 14,000 Japanese troops had been landed at Masampo, the southern port of Korea, and that the harbor had been torpedoed.

Notes.

The Santo Domingo revolutionists under Jimenez have been checked at Puerto Plata by Morales. Report confirmed that Russian influence is to force Peter of Servia to retire. His successor must agree to punish the regicides. In Russia it has been decreed that compensation for employees injured while at work and an annuity to the family of those killed shall be provided. The Uruguayan rebels were defeated by the government Jan. 21, dead and wounded numbering 500.

General.

Bryan Defies Reorganizers.

In an interview at New York Jan. 22 W. J. Bryan said that the so called reorganizers of the Democratic party would not be strong enough to make a

fight at St. Louis against the reaffirmation of the platform of 1896 and 1900. That he would take this stand formal notice was given to the country in his home coming speech at Lincoln, Neb., last week.

In that speech he referred to the signs of corruption in American life and said the cause of it was the commercial spirit that puts a price on everything and resolves every question into "Will it pay?"

In his Holland society dinner speech he made a fiery defense of labor as against corporate debauchery and defiance of law.

General Reyes' Threat.

The Hay-Reyes correspondence was sent to the senate and made public, as requested by General Reyes, who stayed in New York instead of sailing for home. The letters show that the Colombian envoy at last spoke plainly, charging that the Panama revolution was hatched in New York and abetted by our army and navy. He further declared that this country would be held responsible for the loss of Colombian territory in the event that state being unable to recover the Isthmus.

SCIENTIFIC

Air Navigation Near.

John Brisben Walker, the well known editor and manufacturer, at a New York dinner given in honor of Professor S. P. Langley made the deliberate prediction that the flying machine would be commercially available within twelve months and that it would be the cheapest, safest and only recognized means of transportation within twenty-five years.

Professor Langley told of his efforts to solve the flying problem and insisted that the failures on the Potomac last summer were due wholly to defective launching mechanism. In conclusion he said he was too old to finish what he had begun, but he was sure that some younger man would take up the work and succeed.

Notes.

Dr. Brinkmann of New York has secured wide attention by his new theory that the dread pneumonia is directly due to disorders of the abdominal organs causing undue upward pressure of the diaphragm and impeding respiration. Hence diet not likely to ferment or fasting is found efficacious. Peter Thornly, an English engineer, has made a steam valve such that it admits just the required amount of steam into the cylinder of an engine to get the benefit of the expansion from the very beginning to the end of the piston stroke. It is said that it may result in express engines running at twice present speed and at half present cost. The North Jersey Brick company is testing a device for drying bricks the principle of which is the passage of the fresh made brick on endless carriers into a long drying chamber artificially heated to the required temperature. Signals were sent 7 1/2 miles by a submarine bell system, tested near Boston.

Art, Music, Letters

For the first time hypnotism has become a practical aid to art through the experiments of Dr. Magnin, Paris hypnotist, with one of his woman patients. Her attitudes and expressions of various emotions under suggestion have been photographed for studio use.

A new opera by Mascagni, the Italian composer of "Cavalleria Rusticana," deals with the life of Marie Antoinette.

"Parafal" has had its fifth rendering before a reverent audience at New York. A syndicate is planning to duplicate the Balreuth theater at the St. Louis exposition for a "Parafal" performance.

"That Man and I," a play by Mrs. Frances Hodgson Burnett, founded on her book, "In Connection With the De Willoughby Claim," was produced for the first time Jan. 18 at Buffalo. Robert Hilliard had the principal role.

With the Presidential Boomers

Between the untamed force of public opinion and the uncertain weather vane of party approval the presidential possibilities keep the casual onlooker pretty busy. Just now the Republicans who question the advantage of nominating Roosevelt are calling attention to Taft as a safe and able man who would get the Hanna following. Signs of Hanna's strength in the middle west keep cropping to give life to talk of a stampede, and in Ohio the fight over instruction of delegates is on.

It is still anybody's race for the Democratic nomination, and the reorganizers have not got much harmony hope out of Mr. Bryan's defiant demand for the old issues of 1896 and 1900. The Hearst boom is the only one that doesn't openly fear the effect of this stand of the Nebraskan. It keeps right on forming clubs and getting labor endorsements.

The McClellan dark horse, groomed by Tammany, has made its appearance behind the Cleveland and Parker booms.

The prestige of Senator Gorman suffered by his failure to control the senatorial caucus in the Maryland legislature promptly.
