POLITICS and GOVERNMENT

General.

Rayner Chosen Senator.

Isidor Rayner was elected United States senator from Maryland to succeed Senator McComas by the legislature at Annapolis Feb. 3. After a deadlock of several weeks in the Democratic caucus he had secured a majority and ten votes to spare on the preceding day. His victory was a blow to the Gorman machine in Maryland. The choice of Rayner will not serve, however, to appease the wrath of ex-Governor Smith and those who voted for him to the last, for they regard Gorman's support of Carter as treachery to them. Mr. Rayner has been prominent as a lawyer and statesman for many years. He was a member of congress for three terms and made a reputation as an orator. He was counsel for Admiral Schley.

certain confidential naval orders and dispatches on the ground that their publication would not be best for the public interest. Along with this correspondence was a statement showing ten historical precedents for the landing of troops on the isthmus.

Notes.

The end of the canal treaty fight in the senate was foreseen when the majority gave assurances of some plan for compensation of Colombia. Following Admiral Dewey's wishes rather than the general board, the house naval committee decided to authorize more warships and less small craft. The house decided to allow the resident commissioner from Porto Rico to speak on the floor of the house, to introduce bills and to be assigned to committees, practically all the rights of a territorial delegate.

Executive.

Governor Wright Inaugurated.

Governor Luke Wright and Vice Governor Henry C. Ide were inaugurated at Manila, Feb. 1, with a brilliant military pageant. The governor promises to adhere to the policy of the Taft administration.

The Treasury's Deficit.

The treasury statement for January, issued last week, shows a deficit of \$1,784,183 for the month, the total receipts being \$41,588,370 and the disbursements \$48,372,553.

Call For Canal Money.

Secretary Shaw has given notice to all national banks holding federal deposits that they must be prepared to surrender 20 per cent of such deposits so that the treasury may meet the larger payments on account of the Panama canal as soon as the treaty is ratified. This money will be paid over to Morgan & Co. at New York, representing the Panama canal stockholders.

White House Reception.

At the White House reception, Feb. 4, the question of precedence, which was raised at the judiciary reception by having the diplomats received first, was finally settled. The diplomats are to join the receiving party behind the line before the reception for the guests of honor actually begins.

Legal and Criminal.

Amalgamated Copper Wins.

The supreme court of Montana has reversed the lower court in the famous contest between the Amalgamated Copper company and the Heinz interests. The Amalgamated will be allowed to hold stocks in other copper companies and thereunder will be permitted to collect and distribute nearly \$2,000,000 in dividends on stock of the Boston and Montana. Heinz was unable to attack Amalgamated holdings in other Montana mines by injunction proceedings, as McGinniss did in the Boston and Montana.

Ziegler Not Extradited.

Governor Odell of New York has declined the application of Governor Dockery of Missouri for the extradition of William Ziegler, the New York millionaire and patron of science, who was indicted on a charge of bribery in connection with the baking powder scandal in the Missouri legislature. It is held that the fact of the indictment in Missouri is not in itself sufficient ground for extradition. Ziegler submitted evidence to prove that he was not in Missouri at the time specified in the indictment.

Fighting the Oil Trust.

Indictments have been returned at Chattanooga, Tenn., against the Standard Oil company and its agents at that place on the charge of violating the laws of Tennessee against monopolies. The state of Texas has also begun suits against the Standard Oil company for alleged illegal operations in the Beaumont fields.

New York Theaters Closed.

Mayor McClellan of New York early in the week gave warning against nineteen theaters which had failed to begin compliance with the new fire protective orders and on Thursday ordered that five of these should be closed, as all reasonable requests had been

either resisted or ignored. All the others had begun changes within the required time.

Notes.

A sentence of ten years' imprisonment was imposed on George A. Rose at Cleveland, O., for embezzling \$187,000 as cashier of the Produce Exchange bank. Three more officials have been arrested in connection with Milwaukee grafting, making a total of forty-nine indictments. James Smith and his son William of Brooklyn have been arrested by secret service officers for counterfeiting small silver coins out of Mexican silver dollars. A Mexican stagecoach was held up between Ortiz and Las Cruces by Yaqui Indians Feb. 4, and six passengers were killed. Two negroes were lynched near Memphis, Tenn., Feb. 4 for the murder of a planter. Ebenezer Blydenburgh was found guilty at Eldora, Ia., of having poisoned his third wife. A life sentence was recommended.

Foreign.

Mrs. Maybrick Out of Prison.

The newspaper report is confirmed that Mrs. Florence Maybrick, the American woman who has been in an English prison for fifteen years under life sentence on the charge of poisoning her husband, has been released from prison by the British authorities. That is, she has left prison, but will be detained in a private home for several months by special dispensation. Mystery surrounds the place of her detention and the time of her final release.

Uruguay Rebels Victorious.

The news reached Washington, Feb. 4, that the rebellion in Uruguay had assumed serious proportions. The government forces, having been routed in battle, were pursued by the insurgents toward Montevideo, which was in danger of assault.

German Garrisons Rescued.

Word was received at Berlin, Wednesday, from German Southwest Africa that the garrisons at Windhoek and Okahandja had been relieved after heavy losses, Jan. 27, in a furious battle with thousands of natives. The governor of the colony was safe.

King to Reform Army.

Following the report of the Lord Escher commission on the needs of the British army, King Edward has approved of sweeping changes in the war office without waiting for parliament's approval. The war council will be created by royal patent, and the office of commander in chief will be abolished. In its place an inspector general will be appointed. A change in personnel is expected.

SCIENTIFIC

Aluminium Tubes For Radium.

Garrett P. Serviss says that Hugo Lieber's invention of a new method of applying radium in internal surgery is one of the most practical steps yet taken in the development of the power of radium to cure malignant forms of disease. He has substituted for the glass tubes used to hold the substance, and which are known to cut off the most effective part of the emanations, tubes made of aluminium. These permit the passage of the rays which the glass obstructs and are not easily broken, thus making it safe to introduce the tubes into the deeper and narrower passages of the body, such as the esophagus or nostrils, for the treatment of hidden seats of disease.

Notes.

Medical authorities at Hartford, Conn., report that the recent typhoid epidemic in the county jail was started by flies, which carried the bacilli to the jail kitchen from a nearby house where persons were ill with the disease. Professor Bumstead of Yale's scientific school reports to the American Journal of Science that radio active gas is found in the earth and water near New Haven, Conn., identical with the emanation from radium.

Clash of Slav and Mongol Inevitable

Through another week of terrible suspense the world waited while signs of the inevitable grapple of Russia with Japan multiplied. The actual movement of Russia's land and sea forces seemed to foretell the negative character of the czar's long delayed answer to the nikado's demands. Japan, unwilling to wait much longer, held a council of war and took the final steps of preparation.

As if to test the alertness of his foe or "to give him a dare," the Russian commander sent his big squadron of sea fighters out of Port Arthur Feb. 4, cleared for action. Off Weihaiwei they sighted an immense fleet of Japanese warships, virtually patrolling the sea. Next day the Russian admiral put back into port well satisfied that his enemy was not asleep.

So on land thousands of Russian soldiers have been taking up strong positions along the Yalu, and a landing near Chempoo was planned with a view to occupying Seoul. But already Japanese troops were on Korean territory to head off an invasion. Thus while the forms of diplomacy still remained at Tokyo and St. Petersburg, though strained to highest tension, the war lords on either side were fencing for an opening. Japanese residents were warned to leave Vladivostok.
