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Democratic Primary Election and County Convention.

The Democratic voters of Centre county will meet at the regular places for holding the general elections, in their respective elect districts, on Saturday, June 4th, 1904, to elect delegates to the County Convention.

The delegates chosen at the above stated time will meet in the Court House in Bellefonte, on Tuesday June 7th, 1904, at 12 o'clock noon, and nominate the following:

One candidate for the office of President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Centre County.

Two candidates for Assembly.

One candidate for the office of District Attorney.

One candidate for the office of Prothonotary.

One candidate for the office of County Surveyor.

Said delegates so chosen will also at the same time elect:

Three conferees to the next Congressional conference of the Congressional district of which Centre County forms a part.

A Chairman of the County Committee to serve from the 1st day of January 1905 to the 1st day of January 1906, and transact such other business as may come before the Convention.
