POLITICS and GOVERNMENT

General.

Wisconsin Republicans Split.

The Republican state convention at Madison, Wis., last week was controlled absolutely by Governor Robert M. La Follette. Both sides had claimed a majority, but the state central committee was controlled by the governor, and thus the contest for seats were decided in his favor.

Governor La Follette.

The Wisconsin Democratic convention at Milwaukee instructed its delegates to vote as a unit for E. C. Wall as president, the Hearst element being outvoted two to one.

Ohio Republicans Harmonize.

The Republican convention at Columbus, O., was controlled by the Dick Herrick successors to the Hanna machine, but a truce was effected between this faction and the Foraker faction, and both the senators were made delegates at large along with Herrick and Cox.

Iowa Republicans Stand Pat.

All propositions favoring tariff revision were voted down in the convention of Iowa Republicans at Des Moines, and the platform favored reciprocity in noncompetitive products only. This was the idea of Senator Allison and was not favored by the administration. Notwithstanding this distinct return to the "stand pat" tariff policy Governor Cummins announced that he would stand squarely upon the platform and denounced those who tried to make him out a free trader.

California For Hearst.

By a majority of nineteen the Democratic convention at San Francisco decided to endorse the candidacy of W. R. Hearst and sent its delegates to St. Louis instructed for him. The platform contains clauses against the Dingley bill, for enforcement of antitrust laws, for direct election of senators, for parcel posts and for government ownership of railroads.

Hearst Will Not Bolt.

Candidate Hearst has given to the press a formal denial of the report that he, in company with Bryan and other radicals, were planning to bolt the St. Louis convention and organize a third party in the event of their being in the minority. He said, "I am for the St. Louis nominee."

Other Republican Conventions.

Indorsements of Roosevelt have been made by the Republican state conventions of Nebraska, Michigan, North Dakota, North Carolina, New Hampshire and Wyoming. Nebraska suggested John L. Webster for vice president. The North Carolina convention was notable for the absence of the negroes.

Cortelyou to Lead Elephant.

The report that George B. Cortelyou, secretary of commerce and labor, has been selected by President Roosevelt to conduct the Republican party's campaign as chairman of the national committee has been unofficially confirmed and is generally accepted, although the actual choice of a chairman will not occur until the committee meets at Chicago. While opinions of the leaders differ as to the expediency of this choice, all are agreed that Mr. Cortelyou is personally equipped for the task. It is pointed out by some that he has been a Democrat, having voted for Cleveland in 1892. In 1896 he did not vote.

Illinois Republican Deadlock.

After the Republican convention at Springfield, Ill., had been in session eight days and had voted fifty-eight times on the seven candidates for governor without a break in the deadlock, the candidates agreed, May 21, on an adjournment to May 31. Governor Yates remained in the lead, with Lowden second and Deneen third.

Foreign.

Australian Labor Policy.

Premier Watson of the Australian commonwealth announced the policy of the Labor party, which is now in power. He will reintroduce the arbitration bill, so changed as to make state employees subject to it, this being the point on which the former government was defeated after the failure of the state railroad strike. The arbitration court will consist of a judge only, no counsel being permitted without the consent of both sides. Other

points of the programme would be the selection of one commissioner to represent all Australia in London instead of one from each state, old age pensions, state control of tobacco trade and a new banking law compelling banks to hold 40 per cent in government notes.

Austria's Military Budget.

The people of Austria-Hungary have been startled by the enormous army and navy expenditure proposed by the government, amounting to \$51,791,200. This is said to be due to the lessons of the Russo-Japanese war and a desire to hasten the plan of the national defenses. The emperor at a reception intimated that the warlike preparations were the best guarantee of peace.

More Armenian Massacres.

The worst fears regarding the reported devastation of Armenian villages throughout the Sassoun districts by Turkish troops have been confirmed. The powers have sent agents to Erzurum in the hope of limiting the area of destruction. Turkey is believed to be taking advantage of Russia's pre-occupation in the far east to crush the rebellious Armenians.

China Opens Chinanfu.

The state department was informed by Minister Conger at Peking that the Chinese government had decreed the opening of Chinanfu, the capital of Shantung province, to foreign trade. The object of this move is supposed to be to prevent the annexation of this territory by any one country. The city is near the German territory.

French Government Sustained.

The results of the French elections do not show any considerable dissatisfaction either in the rural or urban districts with the Combes government. On the contrary, the Nationalists and opposition parties in general have lost ground almost everywhere.

Notes.

The British force at Gyantse, Tibet, awaits the arrival of a re-enforcing column. The government forces in Haiti defeated the revolutionary troops in battle May 19 near Monte Cristi. The Balfour government has again been sustained by the commons without regard to the tariff question.

Legal and Criminal.

Anarchist Turner Barred Out.

The constitutionality of the anti-anarchist law under which the immigration authorities at New York ordered the deportation of John Turner, the English theoretical anarchist, has been upheld in a unanimous decision of the United States supreme court rendered by Chief Justice Fuller. The court ruled that the rights of free speech and trial by jury do not apply to aliens and hence could not be invoked by Turner. The power of congress to prescribe the conditions under which aliens may enter this country was undoubted and could be delegated to an executive department. The testimony and Turner's own admission placed him in the prescribed class of anarchists. The chief justice declared that in so avowing himself Turner accepted the definition of anarchy as laid down by standard dictionaries. Turner is now in England, having returned voluntarily while at liberty on bail pending the decision.

Flag Advertising Lawful.

The New York law of 1903, in so far as it prohibits the use of the American flag for advertising purposes, was declared to be unconstitutional, May 17, by the state court of appeals. The decision was rendered by Chief Judge Parker.

Texas Loses Trust Fight.

In the district court at Austin, May 17, Judge Brooks sustained the general demurrer to the petition of Texas against the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad company and the Amer-

ican Express company for penalties aggregating \$230,000 for violation of the antitrust act. This is a victory for the companies and settles the case so far as the lower court is concerned. Forty similar suits are pending, involving all the transportation companies in the state, with penalties aggregating \$10,000,000. The case will be appealed by the state.

Tyner and Barrett Testify.

The feature of the Tyner-Barrett trial at Washington was the testimony of Tyner as he sat in his wheel chair near the witness stand. He denied having approved the Barrett opinion in order to drive the bond investment companies affected to Barrett's employ. The aged general spoke feelingly of the fact that he had brought up Barrett and trained his morals as well as his legal mind. Ex-Secretary of State Foster was present to affirm his belief in Tyner's character. Barrett followed with his testimony.

Western Union Backs Down.

The Western Union Telegraph company finally decided, May 18, to go out of the business of gathering and disseminating race horse news throughout this country. This important decision was contained in an order issued east, west, north and south by President Clowry, without stating any reasons therefor. It was in obedience to the force of public opinion behind the fight made by the police and press of New York city against the pool room evil. It was a direct and conclusive confession of the charge, hitherto ignored by the officials of this great common carrier of telegraphic messages, that it was actually in business connection with the pool rooms and gamblers. It was also significant that the action was taken just as District Attorney Jerome was on the point of instituting legal proceedings against that company and its directors.

A tentative but ineffective move in this direction had been made the day before, when President Clowry ordered the racing service to be cut off from all New York city subscribers. The pool rooms were able to run as usual by negotiating with points outside of New York.

Following this action by the Western Union, Police Commissioner McAdoo of New York raided all the big gambling news centers, May 20, confiscating instruments and arresting many men. The pool rooms were seriously crippled. Pinkertons After White Caps. A force of Pinkerton detectives has been distributed through the "White Cap" districts of Mississippi at the instigation of Governor Vardaman, who has undertaken to clear the state of this and other forms of lawlessness. He secured a special appropriation of \$1,500 a year for this work and says he will push it to a finish.

Executive.

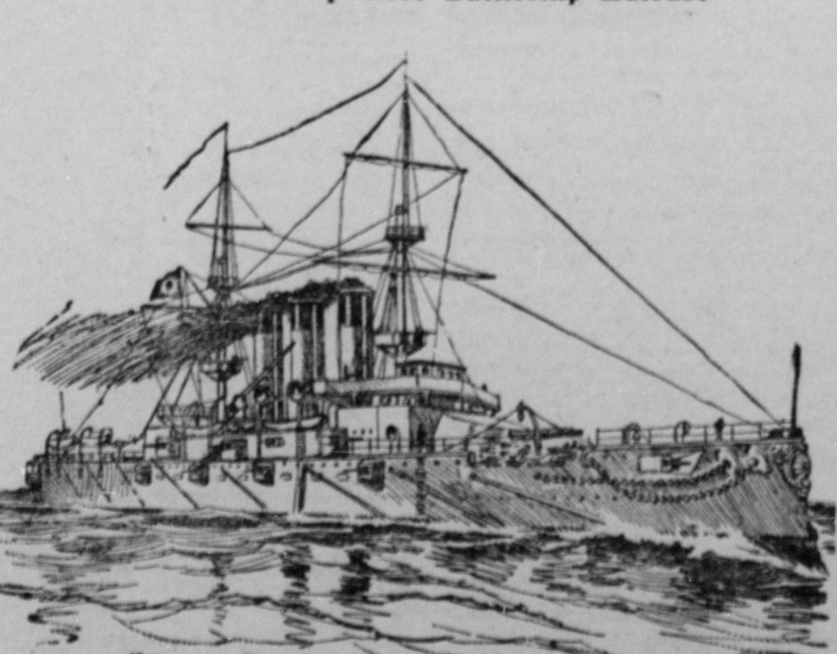
Our Ships Free in China.

The state department decided, May 19, to publish the correspondence between Admiral Evans and Minister Conger respecting the rights of American ships in Chinese waters. The admiral took the stand that his ships could go wherever Americans were allowed to reside and engage in business. This attitude has now been approved by Secretary Hay.

Porto Rican Murderer Pardoned.

By executive order the Minnesota state prison will release Raphael Ortiz, the Porto Rican who killed Private John Burke of the Forty-seventh (Brooklyn) volunteer infantry for having stolen Ortiz's sweetheart. Ortiz will now return to his Porto Rican home.

The Lost Japanese Battleship Hatsuse



This great warship was the pride of the Japanese navy. Her displacement was 15,000 tons, and her length between perpendiculars was 400 feet. Her main battery consisted of four twelve-inch guns in barbets, fourteen six-inch quick firers and twenty twelve-pounders. Of lighter guns she had twenty. She also carried five torpedo tubes.
