What May Be Done With a Box. One of the most useful articles in my kitchen is a common wooden box from the grocery store. It is 28 inches high and 13 by 15 inches wide, open on one side, with a shelf midway. It is the same height as the range, and when getting a meal it is a convenient place on which to set a platter or other dishes. When raising bread I put the pan of dough on the box near the stove. When raising in the loaf one tin stands on top and the other inside on the shelf. If I am tired, I bring the box to the table and use it for a stool to sit on while washing dishes or ironing small articles. If the table is crowded with dishes it can be used to set the dishpan on while washing, as it is nearly the height of the table. The box should be painted the same color as the woodwork. - Woman's Home Companion.

A Child's Meal Hours.
