The report that peace had been declared between the Uruguayan government and the revolutionists under General Munoz was confirmed at Buenos Ayres Sept. 25.

London's New Lord Mayor.

Alderman John Pound, head of the London General Omnibus company, was chosen lord mayor of London Sept. 29 for the ensuing year, succeeding Sir Thomas Richard.

Dominion Parliament Dissolved.

In anticipation of general elections in Canada Nov. 3 the parliament was dissolved Sept. 29 at Ottawa.

Legal and Criminal.

British Diplomat Fined.

The third secretary to the British embassy, Hugh Gurney, who has been spending the summer at Lenox, Mass., was fined for violating the Massachusetts speed law as to automobiles and for contempt of court.

Buffalo Alderman Indicted.

District Attorney Coatsworth of Buffalo, N. Y., opened his campaign against graft, Sept. 26, by notifying seven aldermen or ex-aldermen to answer allegations contained in indictments found upon transactions in connection with city contracts.

Omaha Strikers Sentenced.

Business Agent Stevens and thirty-six of the South Omaha packing strikers were found guilty of contempt by Judge Munger in the United States district court.

Militia Company Punished.

Acting Governor Cunningham of Alabama has approved the report of the military court called to investigate the militia company which failed to protect the negro, Horace Mapples, from lynching on the night of Sept. 7.

Executive.

Armenians See President.

The delegation of Armenian prelates called on President Roosevelt Sept. 28 to thank the American people for contributions to relieve the survivors of massacres in Armenia and to enlist the aid of this nation in preventing future disturbances.

Battleship Connecticut Launched.

In the presence of 35,000 spectators, including Secretary of the Navy Morton and many men prominent in official life, the battleship Connecticut, which, with her sister ship, the Louisiana, is the largest and most powerful war machine in the world, was launched without hitch at the Brooklyn navy yard Sept. 29, being christened by Miss Alice B. Welles, a granddaughter of Lincoln's secretary of the navy.

Connecticut has a displacement of 16,000 tons, a length of 450 feet, breadth of 76.10 and is to be armed with four twelve-inch, eight eight-inch and twelve seven-inch guns.

Carriers With Cyclometers.

To aid the postoffice department in adjusting salaries on an equitable basis the rural free delivery carriers in Minnesota, Wisconsin, North and South Dakota and Iowa are being supplied with cyclometers to measure the distance traveled.

To Call Peace Congress.

President Roosevelt has announced his determination to ask the nations of the world at an early date to join in a second congress at The Hague for the promotion of arbitration.

Cigar Stamp Order Sustained.

Secretary of the Treasury Shaw, summoned from his speechmaking tour in the west to confer with the president at Washington regarding the revenue cigar stamp order, announced, Sept. 29, an official decision in this important controversy between the tobacco trust and the independents.

Denver and Des Moines O. K.

The naval board of inspection have conducted the trial of the protected cruiser Denver off the Virginia capes and found that the vessel met all requirements.

General.

Roosevelt Letter Satire.

A campaign flurry was created by the publication in the Miners' Magazine, official organ of the Western Federation of Miners, of a letter to Michael Donnelly, signed by President Roosevelt, in which an attack is made on union labor and advising Donnelly to put a stop to the meat strike.

Steffens on Wisconsin.

"A state wherein the people have restored representative government" is the definition of Wisconsin made by Lincoln Steffens in his latest article on "Enemies of the Republic" for the October McClure's.

Campaign Notes.

The report came from Des Moines that ex-Speaker Henderson would be unable to appear in public, as announced, on account of physical and mental infirmities.

A significant incident of Candidate Parker's visit to New York was the call of Dr. John H. Girdner, the close

friend of W. J. Bryan, shortly after a visit from ex-Governor Thomas of Colorado, who came to personally deliver the speech recently made by Mr. Bryan at Denver.

The Democratic state convention of Rhode Island has renominated Governor L. F. C. Garvin on a platform dealing mostly with state issues.

The old story of factional strife in the Republican party in Delaware was repeated in the conference at Wilmington. Both the Du Pont, or regular Republicans, and the Addicks, or Union Republicans, have nominated state tickets, uniting only on presidential electors.

Thomas E. Watson, the Populist nominee for president, was taken sick at the close of his speech at Jackson, Miss., Sept. 27, and was advised by his physician that he must cancel further campaign engagements and seek absolute rest.

Following the defunctation of Governor Odell of New York in the state Democratic platform, the Democratic attorney general, Cunneen, made a specific statement of various acts of the Odell administration against which he had rendered opinions.

Robert Treat Paine, Jr., thrice Democratic nominee for governor of Massachusetts, has announced himself for Roosevelt on the negro issue.

Vice Presidential Candidate Fairbanks continued his stumping tour through Minnesota and the Dakotas and Montana. At Helena he made answer to the Parker letter of acceptance by declaring that the president had purged the public service of evil doers.

The United Brotherhood of Carpenters has proclaimed the Democratic national ticket as unfair because Candidate Davis is said to have discriminated against unionism in the Davis Colliery company of Chicago.

An anti-Parker Democratic national league has been organized at Chicago composed of disaffected Democrats.

It was reported that Judge Parker had been persuaded by his managers to make two campaign speeches in different states.

Gregorian Chants at New York.

Archbishop Farley of New York has obeyed the pope in the matter of church music reform. The commission appointed by the archbishop announced its decision in all the churches of the diocese.

Primate's Washington Meeting. It was estimated that an audience of 15,000 people attended the open air service in behalf of church unity on the site of the proposed cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul, overlooking the national capital, Sept. 25.

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Parker Accepts the Roosevelt Challenge

Now that the Democratic standard bearer has put forth his notion of the political issues confronting us, as opposed to the positions taken by the Republican and other candidates, we may look for the fur to fly until the ballots are cast on Nov. 8.

Judge Parker's letter accepting the nomination for president makes constitutionalism the vital issue as opposed to imperialism. This, he says, involves "a decision whether the law of the land or the rule of individual caprice shall govern."

In five brief queries he condenses the leading issues—economy, honest administration, equal opportunity, a government of law and the rule of the people rather than beneficent despotism.

SEVEN MEN STRUGGLE.

To Dehorn a Big Elk Which Gored Two Females, Fights to Keep His Antlers.

It took seven men three hours to dehorn a big bull elk, one of the herd of twelve owned by Alexander Billmyer, of Washingtonville, Montour county, on Thursday last.

About two weeks ago the bull killed a heifer, which it forced into a corner and then tore with its antlers. This was strange, as the bulls usually protect the cows. But a couple of days ago he killed another cow, and it was decided to disarm him.

The bull was lassoed and then secured with ropes, while the antlers were cut piece by piece. The bull struggled, time and again throwing the men off. So stubbornly did he fight that it was three hours before the work was completed, and not a man escaped without bruises.
