Commercial.

Lawson's Insurance Attack.

The beginning of a \$350,000 suit against Thomas W. Lawson in the name of a New York law firm has served to give unusual interest to the current month's installment of Lawson's story of "Frenzied Finance" in Everybody's Magazine.

The Baldwin Locomotive works at Philadelphia have received large orders and are adding to their force of men constantly.

Coke Ovens In Full Blast. According to reports received during the week practically every coke oven in Pennsylvania has been fired, and there is a scarcity of cars to ship the output.

First Air Motoring Club.

For the first time aerial navigation has passed from the realm of science into that of sport. The New York Motor club, which was organized last week, decided after a hot controversy to include in the purposes of the club the promotion of motoring in the air as well as on land and water.

New Football Tactics.

In many of the recent college football matches the spectators have been pleased to see a tendency toward open plays and more free running, which the new rules have made possible.

Lou Dillon's Record Questioned.

The announced record of a mile in 2:01 by the trotter Lou Dillon at Memphis Nov. 11 being disputed by Mr. Smathers, whose representatives timed her in 2:02 1/5, another trial was made Nov. 16. Then she equalled her own and Major Delmar's record, but failed to do her mile in 2:01 flat.

EDUCATIONAL

Cardinal Champions University.

A statement signed by Cardinal Gibbons as chancellor of the Catholic university, since the members of the American hierarchy got together at Washington, pledges the personal fortune of the cardinal if necessary to preserve the university.

University For Pittsburg. About fifty wealthy residents of Pittsburg have agreed to give from \$40,000 to \$100,000 each in addition to what Andrew Carnegie may give toward the upbuilding of a great university on a fifty acre tract near the site of the new Carnegie Technical school.

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Cut Out a Lung.

Howard W. Ferris of Batesburg, S. C., has just returned to his home with no lung or ribs on his right side, after undergoing a hazardous surgical operation at the Hahnemann hospital.

Ferris contracted pneumonia while on a trip as traveling salesman, and for weeks was in a critical condition. Physicians at his home removed pleuritic effusion from time to time, but he failed to recover strength, and came here.

After a rib had been removed, last July, a second operation was performed on August 20. Dr. Carl V. Visser cut out the effected lung and the ribs. Twice while the tedious operation was in progress the doctors thought the patient had succumbed, but each time saline injections revived him.

National Debts of the World.

The aggregate of the interest-bearing debt of the United States on Aug. 31, 1904, was \$875,157,540. This is a small public debt as great nations go. At the date of the latest accessible returns the national debt of Great Britain aggregated very nearly \$4,000,000,000, of which rather more than \$3,200,000,000 was funded.

More Freight Cars.

The Pennsylvania company on Friday announced that it had closed contracts for building of 5,000 freight cars. This is independent of the recent orders for 6,800 freight cars on its lines east and west of Pittsburg, which are to replace the worn-out or damaged cars.
