





Colleges Get Fayerweather Millions.

The famous Fayerweather will case, involving the bequest of \$3,500,000 made to twenty-four colleges by the late Daniel B. Fayerweather of New York, was finally decided by the United States supreme court last week in favor of the colleges and against the heirs. This affirmed the finding of the circuit court. Largest Judgment on Record.

What is believed to be the largest individual judgment rendered by the courts of this country was made last week by Supreme Court Justice Clark Curtiss of Buffalo, a director in the American Malting company, liable for the return of \$1,087.974.59 to the stock holders of that company for dividends filegally declared and paid by the board of directors in 1898 and 1899, with interest. The total amounts to \$1,400,-000. The judgment is based on the idea that dividends could be paid only from the surplus or from net profits, whereas it appears that they were paid out in anticipation of profits from contracts received, using preferred stock to do so.

Eight Hour Law Unconstitutional.

By'a decision of the New York state court of appeals the law of 1897 prohibiting the employment of men more than eight hours a day on city, county or state jobs is declared unconstitutional.






