## POLITICS and GOVERNMENT

### Foreign.

#### Morocco Defies France.

The anti-foreign sentiment in Morocco has resulted in an order from the sultan expelling all foreigners from Fez and causing the powers concerned to withdraw their representatives and to notify their subjects to leave the city. The feeling is especially bitter toward France, and it is thought that if France is to retain her influence in the country a bloody and expensive war must take place. She has made demands for redress, and if not acceded to troops from Algeria, it is thought, will be rushed to take possession of the principal ports and coerce the sultan.

#### Greek Cabinet Resigns.

The Greek cabinet resigned Dec. 24 in consequence of the defeat of the government in the chamber on a vote of no confidence moved by ex-Premier Delyannis, who sharply criticized the government's general policy.

#### King Alfonso to Wed.

The betrothal of Alfonso, king of Spain, to the Duchess Marie Antoinette, daughter of the Archduke Paul Frederic of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, Germany, has been practically settled and will be formally announced on the visit of Alfonso to the Kaiser in February.

#### British Annex Tonga Isles.

Great Britain has assumed control of the legal and financial administration of the Tonga islands, with the consent of the native chiefs. The trade of these southern Pacific islands amounts to \$1,000,000 a year.

#### Haiti's President Sentenced.

Haiti's fugitive president, Sam, has been sentenced by the court at Port-au-Prince to life imprisonment at hard labor for the alleged issue of fraudulent bonds. Mme. Sam is sentenced to fifteen years, and several members of Sam's ministry and other high officials have been condemned to prison. Sam is still residing in St. Thomas isle, Danish West Indies.

#### Another Philippine Massacre.

In the Philippine island of Samar, Dec. 23, the Pulajanes ambushed and killed at Dolores a lieutenant and thirty-seven men of the Thirty-eighth company of native scouts, in command of Lieutenant Abbott. The latter asked for re-enforcements.

#### Port Arthur Fort Dynamited.

The final stage in the siege of Port Arthur continues to attract universal attention, the Japanese having gained a footing on the northeast by the capture of the north fort of Keekwan mountain Dec. 29. This was effected in spectacular fashion by the explosion of dynamite in six tunnels driven under the fort wall. Volunteers charged through the crevices and overcame the garrison. Other Russian forts still held out.

### General.

#### City Ownership at New York.

Since the publication of the facts about the signing of new city light contracts with the Consolidated Gas company of New York and the court order against further payments to this company by the city, popular movement has taken shape looking to the ultimate operation of a municipal lighting plant at the metropolis. This movement was strengthened considerably when a committee of the Citizens' Union adopted resolutions favoring the municipal ownership and operation of public service plants.

#### To Abolish Grand Juries.

By a majority of 121,000 Minnesota voted at the recent election for the constitutional amendment enabling the legislature to do away with the grand jury system. After the passage of the

bill it will not be possible to indict under suspicion unless contributory evidence is at hand to warrant the prosecuting attorney in taking action.

#### Planning to Reseat Peabody.

Despite the fact that Alva Adams, the Democratic candidate for governor of Colorado, still had 10,000 plurality last week, the Republican managers were planning to inaugurate Governor Peabody for another term. Recent supreme court decisions on election frauds at Denver and elsewhere have resulted in a Republican majority of at least thirty in the legislature, which meets Jan. 4.

#### Fairbanks a Mason Quick.

At Indianapolis on Dec. 27 Vice President Elect Fairbanks was made a full fledged Mason in record time, having taken the Entered Apprentice degree at 10 o'clock in the morning, the Fellow Craftsman degree at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and the Master Mason degree at night.

#### Folk's Governorship Plan.

In a speech at St. Louis Governor Elect Folk announced that he would ask the legislature to declare forfeited all franchises secured by bribery and to pass laws requiring all franchises in future to be sold to the highest bidder. He promises that the police departments of all the cities shall be conducted without regard to politics during his administration and that "every man of every party shall have the right to go to the polling place and cast his ballot without interference and have it counted as cast, and no more counted than cast."

### Legal and Criminal.

#### Southern White Cappers Punished.

Judge Wilkinson at Brookhaven, Miss., has imposed one life sentence, five of fifty years, one of twenty-five years and several of twenty years on the Lincoln county White Cappers convicted of doing violence against harmless negroes. This judgment has been applauded throughout the country.

#### Indiana Official's Shortage.

Many business firms and three banks in Cass county, Ind., are threatened with ruin because of the shortage in the accounts of the county treasurer, Frank Obenchain, now a fugitive.

#### Dr. Chadwick Indicted.

Dr. Leroy S. Chadwick, as well as his wife, Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick, has been indicted by the grand jury at Cleveland on the charge of having forged and uttered a \$5,000,000 note signed Andrew Carnegie. Dr. Chadwick is supposed to be on his way from Paris to New York. This makes three indictments against Mrs. Chadwick, but is the first against her husband.

#### To Break Up Paper Trust.

United States Attorney General Moody brought legal action, Dec. 27, against the western paper trust, which he alleges in his charge filed in United States district court at St. Paul has violated the provisions of the interstate commerce laws by restricting competition and regulating the price, sales, shipment and territory of the various mills west of the Mississippi. The companies comprising the trust are enjoined from further doing business through the General Paper company. The price of paper for newspaper printing is said to have been advanced 50 per cent.

### Executive.

#### Seizing Domingo's Customs.

Washington rumor had it settled last week that the administration was about to seize Santo Domingo and occupy it to secure payment of debts. Already an American fiscal agent had seized Porto Plata to collect customs. Mr. Root's New York speech on the Monroe doctrine foreshadowed such a policy.

#### Many Warships Building.

According to the estimates of the navy department twenty-one new warships of various types, including five battleships, four armored cruisers, two protected cruisers, two gunboats, five torpedo boats, two training ships and

one training brig, will be added to the navy during the coming year.

#### Miles Declines a Salary.

Lieutenant General N. A. Miles (retired) by his own request is to be appointed inspector general instead of adjutant general of Massachusetts, thus relinquishing a salary of \$3,000. The inspector general's office is without pay.

#### Census Expert on Sex.

In a bulletin written for the census bureau by Professor F. W. Wilcox of Cornell university it is asserted that women live longer than men and that, taking the population of the world as a whole or that part of it which has been counted with regard to sex distinction, there are several millions more males than females. In the United States he finds the excess of males is greater than the average for all countries, while Europe has an excess of females. American cities especially have more females than males as a rule. This he attributes to the greater opportunity in the cities for women to find employment. Professor Wilcox thinks that the excess of males among the whites and Mongolians is due to the influence of immigration. There has been since 1890 a large increase in the proportion of females attending school in this country. In the period of life beyond the age of eighty-three women are more numerous than men. An apparent excess of women is also noted in the period from sixteen to twenty-five, but the professor explains that this is probably apparent rather than real because of the greater number of women "who claim erroneously to belong to this age period." Among negroes there are more females than males, and the contrary-wise among the Indians.

### SCIENTIFIC

#### A Telegraphing Typewriter.

J. C. Barclay, assistant general manager of the Western Union Telegraph company, says he has perfected a device whereby messages can hereafter be sent by the operation of an ordinary typewriter keyboard. During the past week experiments have been conducted successfully on a wire running from New York to Buffalo. The inventor says that the old system of the Morse operator will be done away with and that messages can be sent with more accuracy and greater speed by this new device. No man will be needed on the receiving end. The only work necessary will be to see that the paper on the machine is kept straight and replaced when a sheet has been exhausted. When put in use this new contrivance is expected to revolutionize the whole telegraph system. For long distances, where "repeating" of messages is essential, Mr. Barclay says he has an attachment that makes it as easy to send from San Francisco to New York as from Buffalo.

#### More Cancer Among Men.

Records of several of the largest hospitals in London have been found to show that cases of cancer have increased steadily since records were begun in 1746, whereas the number among women had not increased since 1884.

#### Plant Life Generates Heat.

While it was known in a general way that the life process of plants generate heat, it has remained for a French scientist, M. Dutochet, to show that the plants have a power of producing a temperature of their own independently of the surrounding atmosphere.

#### Turbine Liner Not a Failure.

The recent report cabled from England to the effect that the new turbine liner Victorian had failed to come up to contract speed is now known to have been a canard. As a matter of fact the turbines were not even in the ship at the time the dispatch was sent. The recent trials of identical cruisers of the British navy, one fitted with a reciprocating engine and the other with a turbine, were distinctly in favor of the turbine.

#### Submerged Coal Is Better.

The Scientific American says that some of the coal which was submerged at Portsmouth by the British admiralty in May, 1903, has been raised and tested in comparison with dry coal. The results showed that the submerged coal had greater heating qualities.

### BOOM FOR PHILIPSBURG.

The Philipsburg Journal of 27 says: We learn with much rejoicing that the New York Central Railroad company has made the appropriation for the construction of the new branch road up the One Mile Run to the several mining operations recently opened along said run, a short distance east of town. In the early spring this road will open a big sweep of valuable coal property, the development of which will mean an era of prosperity to Philipsburg for many years. Messrs. Peale, Horn & Ellis, worth, and Atherton & Barnes, Stratton Brothers and T. J. Lee, will operate extensive mines along the new branch, having already opened valuable seams of coal on their respective properties. The thickest of the veins, in some instances running five and a half feet of solid coal, together with the splendid quality of the same, will make the new mines rank with the leading operations in the Clearfield region. It is the purpose of some of the operators to put in the very finest equipment, and to have the plans up to date in every respect. The consciousness of just what these new developments will mean to Philipsburg's material prosperity has not yet fully dawned on our people. Adding to this the development of the 5,000 acres of coal property owned by Christ Sharer, back of Coal Stream, which is sure to come to pass, in view of the interest manifested by prominent coal operators, Philipsburg may be said to have a future to be greatly envied.

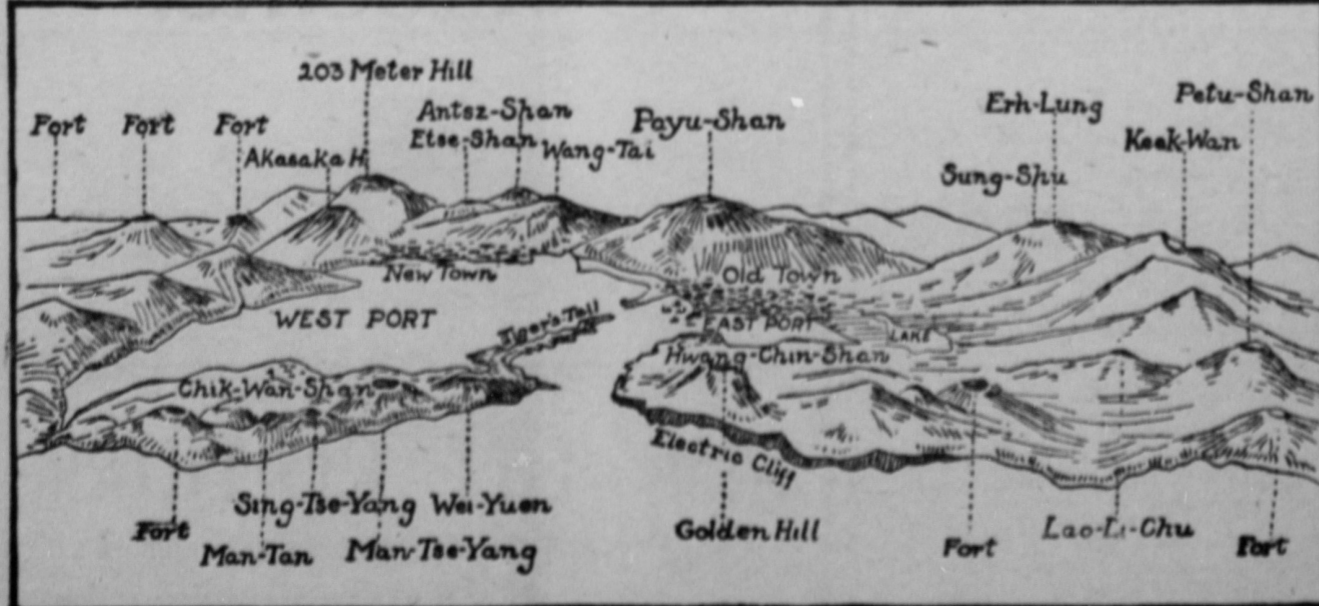
