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
#### TUMBLER TRICK.

You Seem to Force an Ordinary Glass Through a Table.



#### Chicken Pudding. An improvement on old fashioned

chicken pie, which was always a rather insipid dish, is chicken pudding. Cut up two chickens, if a good sized pudding is wanted, and fry them in a very hot saucepan with chopped salt pork and a few slices of onion. The frying is merely to seal the outside, low for this. Fill the saucepan half full of boiling water, season with salt and pepper and stew the chicken until it is quite tender. Remove from the liquor and place in a baking dish. Make a batter with flour, milk, a tablespoonful of butter and three eggs, whites and yolks beaten separately. Pour this over the chicken and bake. Boil down the liquor in which the chicken was stewed, thicken with a roux of flour and butter and serve in a sauce boat with the pudding.
