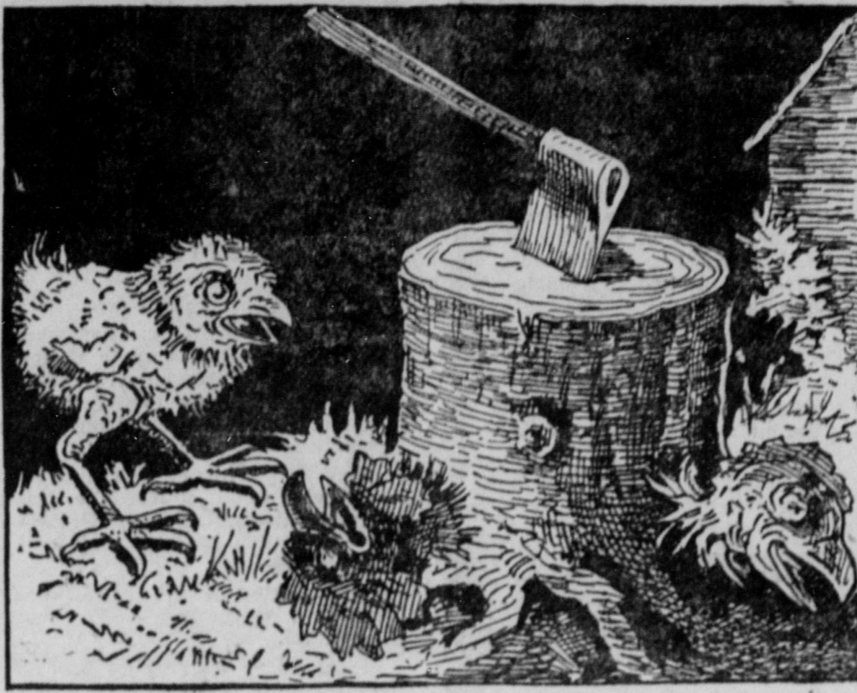
The news in condensed form from all parts of Centre County
