DEER LIVES WITH COWS.

More Than Contented With the Domestic Animals on the Farm.

A doe has been living with a herd of cows near Watsontown for over four months. It goes with the cows to pasture in the morning, returns with them in the evening and sleeps with them in the barn at night.

The deer put in an appearance at a farm on the night of January 3 last, having jumped a high fence to get inside of the barn yard. Knowing of the severity of the game laws the owner of the farm attemdted to drive the doe away. The animal fled to the nearby woods, but returned when the cows came in that afternoon from a stream where they had

Several efforts were made to compel the doe to take to the tall timbers, but failed. The farmer has since cared for the timid animal and it receives its portion of hay and other food as do the
