



#### Labor's Supreme Test at Chicago

Capital, newly armed and equipped with the weapons of organization and legal process, has taken up the gauntlet of labor unionism on

the oft contested field of industry at Chicago. By April 26 the strike of the teamsters against Montgomery, Ward & Co. of Chicago had spread to the wholesale departments of Marshall Field & Co., Carson, Pirle, Scott & Co. and J. V. Farwell & Co., whose teamsters walked out when one man from each house was discharged for refusing to haul goods to Montgomery, Ward & Co. Chicago was then on the verge of one of the greatest labor union struggles in its history, involving the very life of the union movement. The Employers' Teaming association had begun to take the offensive and strikes were expected against every wholesale and retail house in the heart of the city. In issuing their final word to the employees the merchants declared their intention to summon the entire force of city and state if necessary to maintain their position and preserve order. The contracts for truckage were promptly turned over to an emergency organization known as the Employers' Teaming Association company, thus shifting all responsibility under its union contract. This company had been organized with \$1,000,000 capital, and its membership includes all the large mercantile interests. Only men free from union connection will be

employed by it. The issuance of a federal injunction April 28 by Judge Koblsaat to the Employers' Teaming company marked the beginning of a supreme test of strength between the opposing forces. The injunction was against the Teamsters' Joint Council, restraining its members from interfering with the employees of the company. About all the stables of the employers crowds of striking teamsters gathered, and scenes of violence were reported in many parts of the city. Leader Dold of the Chicago Federation of Labor said that every one of the 250,000 unionists in the city would be called out if necessary to win this strike.
