"Tech" to Join Harvard.

The corporation of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology has voted, 20 to 12, in favor of accepting the terms of university, notwithstanding that the faculty of the institute recently voted the union. This means that the largest technical training school in the world will eventually be located in or near Boston.




