BATTLE OF MUKDEN.

The only history yet published of this great combat has just been written. It is told by Francis McCullagh, a correspondent, who went into the battle with the Russian forces, and was captured during the fight by the Japanese.

Mr. McCullagh's history has been secured for publication in Pennsylvania by the Philadelphia North American. It will be published in two instalments, and the first instalment of eight pages will appear as a special supplement added to the Sunday issue of the paper for July 2. It will be completed on July 9.
