Mrs. F. Poorman of this place returned to her home last week after spending a few days at Howard where she attended the Acton-Poorman wedding.

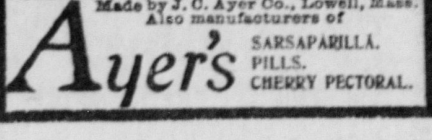
