WADDLE.

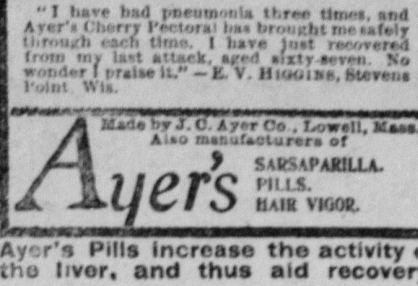
A. C. Thomas purchased another horse recently; it is a dandy.

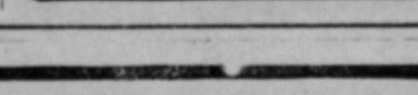
