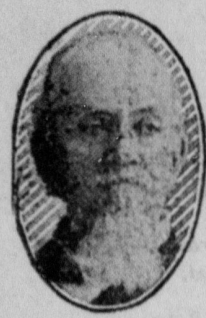


Stories Told In the Cloakrooms



SENATOR E. W. PETTUS.

SENATOR ED-MUND W. PETTUS of Alabama is in his eighty-fifth year and is the oldest man in the senate, but he recently announced that he was a candidate for re-election. 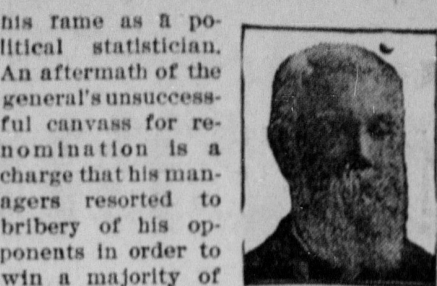
