GEORGE B. PATTERSON—of Ashland, Pa., the youngest Congressman in the Pennsylvania delegation died at Washington, D. C., on Wednesday 21st of heart failure. Mr. Patterson was a Centre countyman. His father at the time of his birth, in 1863, preached in the Jacksonville Presbyterian church. He was elected to the 57th, 58th and 59th Congresses.  
MRS. KATE S. HARKNESS—Wednesday morning, 21, Mrs. Kate S. Harkness was found dead in bed by her husband, Prof. Samuel M. Harkness, principal of the Washington school, at her home in Altoona. Deceased was a daughter of Charles H. and Mary C. Williamson and was born in Centre county, March 20, 1867. She is survived by her husband and three children.
