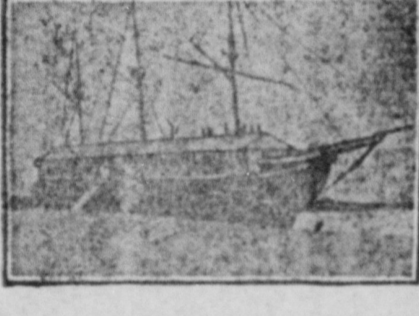


The Old Constitution and the New

NAVAL experts declare that the United States should build a warship which will beat the monster fighting machine of the British navy, the Dreadnought, and it has been proposed that America should eclipse the Dreadnought with a new battleship to be named the Constitution. The Dreadnought was launched a few weeks ago and when completed will be not only the largest and most powerful but the most completely equipped battleship ever built. She is to cost \$7,500,000 and will have 18,500 tons displacement and ten twelve-inch guns. If she were able, when finished, to approach the coast of Long Island of

Mockaway Beach she could throw a 900 pound projectile into Central park, New York. She is the greatest achievement of naval constructors so far, but even the mighty Dreadnought will be a back number in a few years if other nations succeed in their plans to produce ships of heavier tonnage and more powerful armament. France, Germany and the United States are going forward with such plans. The naval affairs committee of the house of representatives has decided to recommend the construction of a battleship having a displacement approximating 20,000 tons and costing nearly \$10,000,000. The navy department is limited to an expenditure of \$6,000,000 for the hull and machinery of the new warship by the terms of the proposed law, and it is estimated that the armament will cost something like \$3,500,000.

The proposal of Secretary Bonaparte that the old Constitution, the frigate affectionately known as "Old Iron-

sides," should be abandoned and used as a target ship has had a result he little anticipated. The sentiment aroused all over the country in favor of the preservation of the hulk has caused the naval affairs committee to insert in the naval bill an item of \$100,000 for such a purpose, and it is expected the name of the ship that did such good service in the war of 1812 will be given to the new battleship. "Old Ironsides" now lies in Boston harbor and has been rebuilt and repaired so many times that but little of her original structure remains. But those who urge this as a reason for abandoning the ship have been reminded that even a human being changes his structure every seven years, yet remains the same individual. The frigate Constitution was launched in 1797 and saw service in the war with Tripoli, when she took part in three of the five bombardments of the port of that name. It was during the war of 1812 that she performed her most notable feat. In July of that year under command of Isaac Hull she was chased by a British squadron off the Atlantic coast for three days, but succeeded in escaping owing to the skill of Hull, who resorted to devices for increasing the speed of his ship which the enemy were unable to match. The exploit was of great value to the Americans, who had but few ships and therefore could not afford to lose any. It was under the redoubtable Hull that the Constitution defeated the British frigate Guerriere, which she left a total wreck after an engagement of thirty minutes. When Hull returned to Boston with a shipload of English prisoners he was received with great rejoicing. Defeats suffered by the land forces had disheartened the Americans. Commodore Hull's victory was the first achieved over the British in this war, and it stimulated the nation and helped it to hold out against its more powerful adversary.

Soon after the victory over the Guerriere Hull turned over the command of the Constitution to Captain William Bainbridge, and it was under this brave officer that the American frigate, on Dec. 29, 1812, off Bahia, Brazil, captured the Java after a two hours' engagement in which the British lost 200 killed and wounded and the Americans but thirty-four. As commodore, Bainbridge was in command of the Hornet and Essex as well as the Constitution, but the latter vessel had parted from the others when the fight with the Java took place. The Constitution won new laurels in this victory over the British. Bainbridge was wounded in the conflict. He was one of the most prominent figures in the war with Tripoli, in which he was captured and held for some time as a prisoner.

For Bleaching the Hands.
A good paste for improving and whitening the hands is made by blanching half a pound of bitter almonds and beating them to a smooth paste with a gill of rose water. Add gradually half a pound of clear, strained honey. When thoroughly mixed, pack into small jars, pouring on the top of each a little rose water. Keep closely covered.

Another salve for softening the hands is made by taking a quarter of a pound of castile soap and shaving it in thin slices. Put this in an earthenware or

porcelain lined pan, with just enough water to moisten it. Let it simmer slowly until dissolved and then stir until perfectly smooth, thickening it with Indian meal. Take from the fire and beat hard with a silver spoon, adding a little orange or rose water when cool. When thoroughly mixed, pack into small covered jars.
