mand on one side of a river and a force of Filipinos on the other. Calling for volunteers who could swim, he selected twenty men, told them to follow him and, holding his revolver up, swam the stream. The men put their guns on logs and followed and captured the enemy. At Calumpit he crossed the Rio Grande river on a small bamboo raft in face of heavy fire and established a rope ferry, by means of which the American troops were enabled to cross and win the battle. This record won him promotion in 1899 to the rank of brigadier general of volunteers. It was Funston, too, who captured Aguinaldo. He became a brigadier in the regular army in 1901.

Mayor Schmitz has been known as a "labor mayor." He was elected as the candidate of union labor and was long active as a labor leader. He has more accomplishments than usually belong to men who make politics a profession. He is an athlete, six feet tall, and a hunter, fisherman and sportsman. He is a musician and began his career in a theatrical orchestra. His mother was Irish and his father a German. He is noted for his wealth and generosity. Another prominent figure in the scenes following the San Francisco disaster has been the chief of police, Jeremiah F. Dinan. He was appointed to his post just a year ago.

Many firemen were killed in their efforts to prevent the destruction of property, and among them was Chief D. J. Sullivan, who was hit by a falling chimney and died from the injury.

The governor of California, Dr. George C. Pardee of Alameda, who has been active in collecting funds for the sufferers, was born in San Francisco in 1857 and is a graduate of the University of California and of Cooper Medical college. He headed a reform movement in Oakland and was elected mayor of that city, and in 1902 was elected governor. He is the first mative of the state chosen to that office.
