

PASSENGER TRAINS COLLIDE

Many Persons Were Injured--Engineer Disobeyed Orders-- Cars Were Telescoped--Postal Clerk Yearick, of Hublersburg, Injured.

Ten persons were killed in the collision on the Petersburg branch of the Pennsylvania Railroad at Clover Creek Junction, 18 miles east of Tyrone, last Friday night, when the Chicago mail bound east and the Chicago and St. Louis express bound west met head-on. It is supposed that between twenty-five and thirty persons were injured.

Owing to a wreck of freight cars on the main line of the railroad at Union Furnace, the express trains had to be sent between Altoona and Huntingdon over the Petersburg branch. The mail train had run by Altoona and had reached Tyrone, when it was held up and sent back to Altoona.
