AFTER ANOTHER TRUST.

Here is a trust that has been specially feeding upon farmers. The grand jury of the United States Circuit Court in Nashville, Tenn., which has been investigating the alleged fertilizer trust, for the past four weeks, on Saturday returned an indictment against day returned an indictment against about eight fertilizer manufacturers. The indictment contains six counts, detailing in specific form alleged evasions of the anti-trust laws, and charging the defendants with combining and being engaged in a trust or combination.

The defendants live in various parts of the country where fertilizers are manufactured and certified copies of the indictment will be sent to the various districts in which the defendants reside and there served. The defendants will be required to execute bonds for their appearance at the October term of the Court in Nashville, when the cases are to be tried. The grand jury examined during the investigation 140 witnesses and the indictment returned is a voluminous document.
