Sheridan Gray and family, of Hays, returned home after visiting his wife's parents.

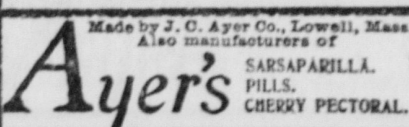
