James Gallagher Falls Under Train at the Station.

Young Man and Resided at Howard -- No One Saw the Accident.

A sad accident took place in Bellefonte Friday night by which James Gallagher. of Howard, met an awful death. The unfortunate young man came to Bellefonte in the morning and, after going around with some of his friends in the town, went to the Centre county fair. He was there all afternoon and towards evening he returned to Bellefonte with the intention of taking the 8:16 train for Howard. It was about 8 o'clock when the Bellefonte Central train from State College pulled into the station. After unloading their passengers they backed up onto the trestle over Spring creek to get out of the way of the 8:16. He was at once taken to the Bellefonte

ospital, but an examination showed that he was beyond human aid. His right leg was crushed to the thigh, his left toes crushed and there was an abrasion on the head. The doctors made no attempt to operate on him, knowing it was useless, and he died at 1:10 Saturday morning, having never regained consciousness. The remains were taken in charge Saturday morning, by undertaker W. H. Neff, of Howard, and conveyed to his home at that place.

James Gallagher was 22 years of age and was employed at the handle factory at Howard. He was a young man of kind disposition, and had hosts of friends.
