

ELECTIONS ELSEWHERE

Republicans Retain Control of Congress by Good Majority.

WILL BE NO MATERIAL CHANGE

Democrats Gain Representatives in Some States and Republicans in Others—Nicholas Longworth Re-elected.

Elections were held in 42 states, and while the results in a number of instances were of unusual interest, it may be said that generally speaking there were no great surprises.

Throughout the south the Democratic state and congressional tickets have been elected by the usual majorities. In the west and east the states that were aligned two years ago in the Democratic or Republican columns show no material change, the Democrats making gains in some instances and the Republicans in others.

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Michigan, Iowa, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Connecticut, Minnesota, Indiana and Wisconsin have rolled up Republican pluralities, although there was some falling off from the usual vote in Iowa.

Nebraska shows big Republican gains. Ohio also shows Republican gains over the Pattison vote of last year. The Republicans expect a plurality of 70,000 in the state.

The constitution of the new state of Oklahoma will be written by Democrats. The Indians voted the Democratic ticket almost solidly. Oklahoma also went strongly Democratic in choosing delegates to the constitutional convention.

New Mexico and Arizona have voted favorably on the proposition to enter the Union jointly as a single state.

Governor Hoch is re-elected in Kansas by a slightly reduced majority. The result in Missouri is in doubt at a late hour, the Democrats expecting to gain some of the congressional districts they lost two years ago.

Congressman Nicholas Longworth was re-elected in Cincinnati. Congressman J. W. Wadsworth, for many years chairman of the house committee on agriculture at Washington, was defeated in the 34th New York district.

The Republicans carried Utah, Wyoming and Washington, and seem to have lost Nevada, while both parties are claiming Colorado.

Congressman Babcock, of Wisconsin, formerly chairman of the Republican congressional committee, failed of election.

In Rhode Island James H. Higgins, D., is elected governor. Congressmen Elected.

Big Republican Majority in Michigan. Detroit, Nov. 7.—Governor Wamer and the entire Republican state ticket have been elected by 60,000 to 100,000 majority, the Republican congressional candidates in each of the 12 Michigan districts having been elected, and the Republicans will have a large majority in the state legislature, with a possibility of its entire membership.

Democrats Carry Rhode Island. Providence, R. I., Nov. 7.—Returns show that Mayor Higgins, of Pawtucket, D., has carried the state for governor by 6000. Thirty-five districts gave Governor Utter, R. 5540, and Higgins 4787. Last year these districts gave Utter 5720, and former Governor L. F. C. Garvin, D., 2914.

Republicans Carry Utah. Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 7.—The Republicans in Utah have elected their state ticket by the usual plurality, returning Joseph Howell to congress and electing Joseph E. Frick justice of the supreme court.

PRESIDENT RECEIVED RETURNS

His Greatest Interest Was Centered In Gubernatorial Fight In New York.

Washington, Nov. 7.—President Roosevelt eagerly awaited the returns from the elections as they came in over the telegraph wires to the executive offices. After dining with his family on his return from Oyster Bay he hurried to his office, where, with Secretary Root, Postmaster General Cortelyou, Assistant Secretary Bacon, Secretary Loeb and Assistant Attorney General Cooley, he scanned the reports furnished him by the Press Association, and by various private sources all over the country. The greatest interest centered in the reports from New York, where the early returns indicated that if Mr. Hughes were elected, the claims of his managers of large majorities for him would be materially reduced. Early in the evening Secretary Root estimated that Mr. Hughes' majority might vary between 60,000 and 75,000. One of the dispatches received by Secretary Root came from the editor of the Press at Utica, in which city the secretary made his only speech of the campaign. This dispatch indicated the re-election of Representative Sherman and the success of Mr. Hughes in Oneida county by a majority of about 3000.

An early personal telegram to the president said that Hughes had carried Oyster Bay by 152 majority.

MASSACHUSETTS REPUBLICAN Governor Guild Re-Elected and Entire State Ticket Goes Through.

Boston, Nov. 7.—The Republicans, after a short but spirited campaign, were victorious in the state election. Governor Guild was re-elected by 37,000 plurality. His opponent, District Attorney John B. Moran, of Boston, the candidate of the Democratic and Prohibition league, received a somewhat larger vote than that given the Democratic candidate a year ago.

The Republicans re-elected their entire state ticket, although Lieutenant Governor Draper fell considerably behind Governor Guild. The next legislature will be Republican by the usual large majority in both houses, and this will insure the election of United States Senator W. Murray Crane, who is at present completing a brief term.

The Massachusetts delegation to congress will remain practically the same, although spirited contests in the Fifth, Sixth, Tenth and Eleventh districts made the result in those section doubtful at an early stage of the tabulation.

The outcome of the election was a considerable disappointment to Mr. Moran and his fellow campaigners—E. Gerry Brown, of Brockton, candidate for lieutenant governor, and George Fred Williams, of Dedham.
