David G Osman Killed. David G. Osman, son of Lemuel Osman, who resides near Pine Hill, was run down by an engine and killed near McGarvey's station, Wednesday afternoon of last week. The engine was running light down the mountain and the unfortunate man was sent back to protect his train, and he was struck by a passenger "snapper" and so badly injured that he died at the Altoona hospital shortly after the accident, his chest being crushed, scalp lacerated and his right leg crushed. Mr. Osman was born at Pine Hill. He was aged 25 yrs. and resided in Altoona for the past four years. He worked for a time as a brakeman in the Altoona machine shop yard and later became a flagman on the Pittsburgh division. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Trainmen and was held in high esteem by his fellow trainmen and a sister, Mrs. C. M. Fry, of Altoona. He was also a nephew of J. T. McCornic, of State College. The remains were taken to State College for interment.
