ANOTHER VIEW.

FOR THE DEMOCRAT: In your paper of last week you state the reason there were no papers filed by chairman of the Democratic County Committee, under the late Primary Election Law, was because the law was believed to conflict with the rules of the party, and this, some of the papers say, is Chairman Donnelley's views. These views are all erroneous. The party rules are only adopted by consent of men who have common political views and agree as to how they shall be carried out. They do not stand a moment against a positive legislative enactment. The party rules, however, much as they conflict with the Primary Election Law or how much the law conflicts with them, must give way to the law. It is the clearest kind of demagoguery to hold that rules must be changed to meet the Act of Assembly. They are knocked out by the act and are of no force whatever. Chairman Donnelley's belief is only a scheme based on a very poor foundation, to keep up the old ring now running the Democratic party, without having any expression from the rank and file of the party.
