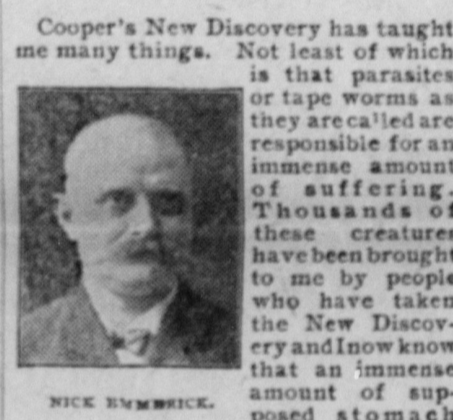
AARONBURG.
