EDITORIAL.

THE TWENTY-NINE million dollars fine imposed upon the Standard Oil Company, for its persistent violation of the law for over twenty years, is a light fine for the billion; it has robbed off the public. Rockefeller alone is able to pay that fine of twenty-nine millions and still have six hundred and fifty million dollars left! Poor fellow, that Rockefeller.

It is related that the lightning struck the old mansion home of Governor Pennypacker at Schwenksville twice, at the very hour when the State Capitol Commission was reading its report to Governor Stuart at his Executive office in Harrisburg and it did a lot of damage to the roof of this famous house in which Washington once had his headquarters. None of the Pennypackers heard the lightning claps.

THERE is well grounded suspicion that machine leaders are aiming to stave off the trial of the capitol grafters until after the election, hoping thereby to draw the attention of the people from the great robbery and thus gain votes for Sheats, Penrose's nominee for state treasurer; and also to give the gang time to pack the jury so as to favor the criminals—this packing of juries, to help the guilty, when being tried, was done in the case of Sam Salter, Matt Quay, and other.

PENNYPACKER, while yet occupying the executive chair, proclaimed to the people, the capitol was finished and cost only four million dollars. That turned out not true. He again said, the capitol was a thing the people ever could be proud of. That turned out to be untrue—it is a fraud of the blackest. He said the capitol is worth every cent it cost. That is not true. He said later he thought there was something wrong, "but did not like to say anything." Pretty Governor, sworn to faithfully guard the interests of the Commonwealth. He favors Sheats for Berry's place, as state treasurer.

SECRETARY-OF-WAR Taft delivered an address in Lexington, Ky., one day last week, in which he lamented a solid South and advised that it cease to be solid. This is an old hobby of these croakers about the "solid south." Why not sweep before their own doors, the Democrat would ask, and discontinue the solid North which existed near half a century up to date, and was the cause of there being a solid South. A FITTING COMMENT.

"The Keystone Gazette, of Bellefonte, denounces State Treasurer Berry as a "blatant demagogue." We could name seventeen other Republican office-holders in the state who will heartily endorse Editor Hartner's views. But the other seventeen are so uncomfortably close to the penitentiary that honest Republicans and honest men generally have given them the shake. There are a few thieves and grafters who don't like Berry because he "lifted the lid" and exposed the state capitol jobbery, "but there are upwards of a million voters who do like him, who have confidence in his honesty and integrity and who respect him for his courage and fidelity. COMMISSIONERS' RIGHT.

When the return judges, for the recent spring primaries under the new election law, made their returns there was a big hubbub about the commissioners' office over the amount of mileage to be allowed. The commissioners maintained that they were allowed to pay but 5 cents for each mile traveled or 10 cents one way (the circular mile). Others insisted that the term "circular mile" meant every mile, going and coming. A big lot of loud talk was indulged in, and several officious attorneys hunting business threatened to "eat 'em alive" if they, the commissioners, did not pay the 10 cent-a-mile rate.

The matter was adjusted for the time by the commissioners paying 5 cents-a-mile for every mile traveled, and promised to advance the balance when the State Treasurer approved and paid.

It now is in order to say that the State Treasurer allowed only 5 cents-a-mile for each mile traveled and not 10 cents, as most demanded. In several counties the full 10 cents was paid and the State allowed them but 5, and the excess is a loss to the counties unless they can recover from the return judges. This is another instance to show that we have a careful board of County Commissioners, who are not easily intimidated by bluffers nor are they entitled to all the abuse that at times is heaped upon them, by those who may be mistaken.
