

wrong if I did not once again wage battle in the courts for my own honor." Powers was the Republican claimant of the office of secretary of state when the assassination of Governor. Goebel occurred, and it was charged by the prosecution that he was one of the parties to a conspiracy against Goebel's life and that the fatal shot was fired from a window in his office. It was on Jan. 30, 1900, that Goebel was shot. He died a few days later, taking the oath of office as governor on his deathbed. Powers' arrest and incarceration in jail followed soon afterward, and the intervening years he has spent in confinement, never losing courage and after each conviction securing a new trial. He claimed that he never would have been convicted but for the juries being composed of Goebel Democrats. His efforts to have his case removed from the state courts and tried in a federal court were unsuccessful. When his fight for his liberty and good name exhausted all the funds at his command, aid came to him from all over the country from those who had been convinced of his innocence or who desired that he have a full opportunity to prove it. Among the latter were many prominent Kentucky Democrats who alded him in the belief that the fair name of the state was involved in the case and that, whether innocent or guilty, no one should be able to say that the prisoner could not obtain justice in his state.

Powers is now about thirty-seven years of age. He was admitted to the bar two years before he became a candidate for secretary of state in Kentucky. He is tall and fine looking, but he has had to make a fight to retain his health while in confinement. He once attended the West Point academy, but had to leave before completing his course on account of the condition of his health. While in jail he has exercised several hours each day with Indian clubs and usually walks a great deal about his cell, with every aperture open for the admittance of air and sunlight. He estimates that he has walked enough to girdle the globe in his daily perambulations. He has written a book containing his life story and the account, from his point of view, of the troubles culminating in the shooting of Goebel, and this work has aided considerably in swelling his defense fund. His correspondence is heavy, and, though he operates a typewriter himself, he sometimes has had to employ a stenographer in order to attend to it. Thousands of people have visited him in his cell, he has had seventeen offers of matriage from romantic young women, and, according to his own statement, opportunities to escape have not been lacking. But he says he does not want his liberty unless with it his honor can be restored. It stands.




