Dr. John Bennett has received word from State Veterinarian Leonard Pearson that a disease of the horse and mule, entirely new in North America, has been recognized in Western Pennsylvania, cases having been reported from Jeffer-son, Clarion and Butler counties. The disease is epizootic lymphangitis, which has long been known in most other parts of the world.
