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EDITORIAL.

AFTER JANUARY 1, 1908, clergymen who have been traveling on the railroads at half rates, will be compelled to pay full fare.

THE money stringency throughout the country has had a good effect, it has set the business world to sober thinking and conservative action.

OKLAHOMA now is one of the states and promises to become a great commonwealth. Up to this time she has displayed a marked tendency towards the democracy.

BRYAN has announced his willingness to accept the Democratic nomination for the presidency, if his leadership is desired and has stated upon what platform he would stand. This has aroused much criticism, favorable and unfavorable.

In the opinion of Senator Tillman Speaker Cannon will be the Republican candidate for President and William J. Bryan the candidate of the Democrats. Champ Clark also thinks Bryan will be the Democratic nominee.

UNDER a recent act of the legislature, the premiums paid by fair associations are refunded by the state, through county treasurers, excepting for speed contests, and where the amount does not exceed \$1,000. The Grange Fair association of Blair county has received from this source for the fair of 1907 the snug sum of \$422.25.

"THE conditions on the senatorial question will be a repetition of those that existed in 1899. There will be several candidates for the succession of Senator Penrose and their combined votes will prevent the election of Penrose." Auditor General Young made this statement. He did not want it regarded as personal declaration against the senior senator, whom he will oppose at the proper time, but rather as an opinion of the political situation as he finds it. He would say nothing further on the subject beyond the intimation that the anti-Penrose element will become active within a short time.

IT is a notable fact how prompt and unrelentingly men are arrested for a violation of the game laws, by spies appointed as wardens, and heavily fined. Many of these violations are unintentional and from an ignorance of the laws which are a jumble that even judges of the courts interpret differently. But, on the other hand, there are the robbers of millions in the capital graft, clearly guilty, as found upon investigation, yet not one of the scoundrels brought into court and every effort being planned to make a mockery of a trial if brought to that. The first above persecuted, are innocent offenders, and the latter are machine politicians. Such is the kind of justice meted out under machine rule.

THE Gazette of last week set before Chairman Harry Keller was of such a waxy mixture that it's hardly relished by Mr. Keller who is accustomed to something more palatable. In making a careful analysis of this sop it was found to contain one part of Kellerman and four parts of Harterism, and that would certainly choke Mr. Keller if he attempted to gobble it down all in one swallow. He needs to take a little bit of it at a time so as to be sure it is all right. No man can serve two masters, as the editor of the Gazette has been trying to do ever since he emigrated here from Snyder county. As long as Judge Love has full control of the Gazette, Keller need never look for anything from that source, notwithstanding he has a bouquet thrown at him every once in a while, especially when he is needed. The scent of these bouquets must be very obnoxious to the sensitive nostrils of the county chairman. After what Harter tried to do with William Chambers in the Bellefonte postoffice, Keller wants to be on his guard and not bestow too much confidence in a man who has so little regard for his word.

STATE'S TOTAL.

The state department completed the compilation of the official returns of the recent election for State Treasurer in Pennsylvania.
The vote follows: Sheats (Republican) 459,965; Harman (Democrat) 312,737; Stevenson (Prohibition) 29,830; Clark (Socialist) 14,346; scattering, 5; total, 816,883; Sheats' plurality, 147,228; Sheats' majority, 103,647.

STAND BY THE EMIGRANT.

A grave offense was committed by the Daily News, of this place, in its Thursday issue, by publishing, with flaming headlines, the arrest of the late republican state treasurer, Frank G. Harris, on the charge of having a \$20,000-hand in what caused the looting of the Enterprise Bank of Allegheny county several years ago, which failed, thereby causing a loss to several thousand depositors of their earnings placed into that bank, and led the President of that looted institution to commit suicide, leaving back a note that charged republican politicians with having looted the bank and causing the failure. The offense committed by our down-street Daily, is that it printed this arrest, when it might have well known that some months ago the vernal Keystone Gazette boldly pronounced this Enterprise Bank looting and consequent failure, a "lie" and all as "liars" who said so—the same as it said of the capitol looting, in which Harris is also implicated. Tuten should not publish news items which Emigrant Tom has already branded as "a lie." Stand by the Emigrant—no matter what the truth may be.

THE STRIKING DIFFERENCE.

Thirteen years ago the State of Minnesota began the erection of a new capitol which is now ready for occupancy. It is said to be as fine in every respect of beauty or utility as the State Capitol at Harrisburg. The total cost has been \$4,500,000. This is less than the cost of the "furnishings" of the Harrisburg structure and not in excess of original estimates. There is food for reflection in this comparison for Pennsylvania taxpayers who have been swindled out of five million dollars and who under the tardy processes of investigation and prosecution have as yet no assurance of the recovery of their money or of the punishment of their plunderers.

FRAUDS are already being shown up in state road making. And when the truth is known, perhaps Mahoning township, in Montour county, may not be the only district in which a "bum job" was done on a new state road. Recently the state undertook to repair the road, and it was found that the road was deficient in nearly every particular. In some places there were only three inches depth of foundation, where there should have been nine, and also the road is from one to four feet too narrow along its entire length of about 3,000 feet. The state roads smatter too much of "pulls" to be any good.

WHAT assurance can the North American give that Sheatz, as State Treasurer, will prove as faithful as Mr. Berry in halting frauds and attempted frauds upon the state treasury? If Sheatz does not follow in the footsteps of Mr. Berry, which we trust he will—what will the North American have to say to the people, since it opposed Mr. Harman whose record was clean and unassailable, and who was nominated by those with whom that journal fought for a dozen years, whilst Sheatz was notoriously the nominee of the gangsters? If he proves true as Berry, the Centre Democrat will say, amen.

OWING to the scarcity of money the prediction now is made that in the next six months there will be a decided drop in prices in all arounds. Of late all necessities of life have been soaring sky high, to abnormal rates, making living expenses beyond former incomes. Just what the result will be remains for the future to adjust. While wages have gone up other things have made more rapid increase and where the benefit came in many now are unable to figure out.

NO NEW LICENSES.

This year license court will be held on Saturday, December 14th, and the last day for filing applications in the office of the Prothonotary will be tomorrow Friday, November 22nd. Heretofore petitions were presented to the court in the first week of March. The change of time was made for the convenience of landlords as it will afford them more time before April 1st, to make their arrangements, as well as for the Court to consider all the petitions and remonstrances. Yesterday there were twenty-nine petitions filed, and none of them were for any new localities. There are three new petitioners for places now having license—G. W. Clark, of Millheim; A. S. Garman, of Bellefonte; and Thos. Faxon, Rebersburg.

Next Sabbath has been designated as the World's Temperance Sunday, and will be observed in nearly all the churches of Bellefonte, as in all probability will be the case in the churches throughout this country. The growth of sentiment in behalf of temperance, local option or prohibition at the present time is the talk of everybody. A well known Pittsburg politician—chairman of the Allegheny County Republican committee—designated the thing as a Niagara, and in addition to falling in line himself, urges others to do likewise.

Evidently President Roosevelt went too far South for his bear meat. The mountain of Central Pennsylvania would afford him much better hunting. In the last five days no less than 11 bears have been shot near Paddy Mount, on the line of the Lewisville & Bellefonte Railroad. They are so plenty that the crews of the freight trains see them crowing near the railroad nearly every day as they pass by. Some bear hunters returning to camp roused up a fawn deer.

Dr. John Bennett has received word from State Veterinarian Leonard Pearson that a disease of the horse and mule, entirely new in North America, has been recognized in Western Pennsylvania, cases having been reported from Jefferson, Clarion and Butler counties. The disease is epizootic lymphangitis, which has long been known in most other parts of the world. It is infectious but not generally fatal, though it always impairs the usefulness and value of the animal infected. The most common manifestation of the disease consists in the presence of small discharging ulcers in the vicinity of the hock joint of a thickened hind leg.

An ordinance to provide for the appointment of a Board of Managers for the E. J. Pruner Home for Friendless Children and defining the powers and duties of said Board of Managers. WHEREAS, the late E. J. Pruner in and by his last will and testament, duly probated and recorded in the office of the Register of Wills for and for the county of Centre, devised to the boroughs of Tyrone and Bellefonte certain property said last will and testament described for the purpose of establishing and conducting a Home for Friendless Children to be located in the said borough of Bellefonte and to be known as the E. J. Pruner Home for Friendless Children. AND WHEREAS, the said borough of Bellefonte and the said borough of Tyrone by ordinances duly passed on the 14th day of March A. D. 1905, accepted the provisions of said will and the devise of property therein made for the purposes designated. NOW THEREFORE be it enacted and ordained by the Council of the borough of Bellefonte and the Council of the borough of Tyrone that the Board of Managers for the E. J. Pruner Home for Friendless Children be constituted as follows: SECTION I. That the management and control of said E. J. Pruner Home for Friendless Children be committed to a Board of Managers consisting of six persons, three of whom shall be appointed by the Council of the borough of Bellefonte and three of whom shall be citizens of the borough of Bellefonte. That the President of the Council of the borough of Bellefonte shall be one of the members of the said Board of Managers. That the President of the Council of the borough of Tyrone shall be one of the members of the said Board of Managers. That the Treasurer of the Council of the borough of Bellefonte shall be one of the members of the said Board of Managers. That the Treasurer of the Council of the borough of Tyrone shall be one of the members of the said Board of Managers. That the Board of Managers shall meet on the first Monday of March A. D. 1908, and at the same time in each year thereafter the President of said Council shall appoint one person as a member of said Board of Managers to serve for a term of two years, or until the first Monday of March A.
