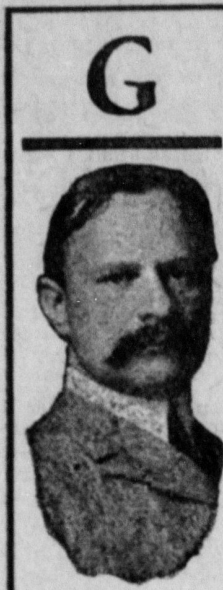

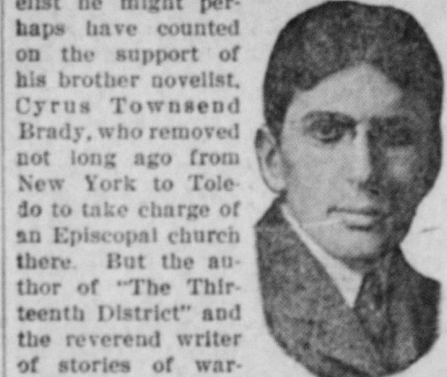

When the late Duke of Alva and his wife were in this country at the time of the Chicago World's fair much was said about the family. An incident of the November elections was the defeat for mayor of Metuchen, N. J., of Dr. Charles M. Freeman. 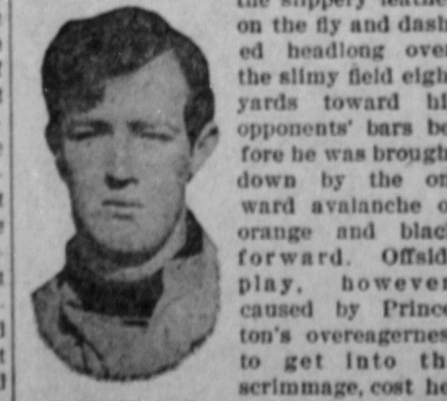
He denied the charge and said it was trumped up by his political opponents. Dr. Freeman, though a medical graduate, does not practice medicine, as he has a lumber business that nets him a larger income than he would be likely to obtain through fees from Metuchen patients. He met Mrs. Freeman at the home of William L. Alden of Harper's Weekly, and his courting lasted for quite a term of years, as his talented fiancée caused the postponement of the wedding several times in order that she might complete certain literary work upon which she was engaged.

Literature and politics were also mixed in the campaign in Toledo, where Brand Whitlock was up for re-election as mayor. Mr. Whitlock won by over 5,000 majority, running as an independent against the nominees of both Democrats and Republicans. As a novelist he might perhaps have counted on the support of his brother novelist, Cyrus Townsend Brady, who removed not long ago from New York to Toledo to take charge of an Episcopal church there. But the author of "The Thirteenth District" and the reverend writer of stories of warfare and adventure found themselves on different sides of the political fence, and Dr. Brady, who inherits a love of fighting, took an active hand in this particular contest. Mayor Whitlock received about 2,000 more votes than when he was elected the first time. He was a disciple of the late Mayor "Golden Rule" Jones and on the latter's death inherited his mantle. He still writes, and he has the advantage when discussing matters pertaining to government and sociology of being able to speak from an experience gained in daily contact with such problems. The mayor ran on a Golden Rule platform this time, just as he did before.



The victory of the Princeton football eleven over the Carlisle Indian team was in no small degree due to the terrific line smashing play of the gallant Princeton captain, J. H. McCormick. His position in the Tiger eleven is that of fullback. Shortly after the game was called McCormick lifted the ball from a little tee at midfield and sent it whirling end over end to the Indians' five yard line. The Indian player Mount Pleasant leaped ahead, caught the slippery leather on the fly and dashed headlong over the slimy field eight yards toward his opponents' bars before he was brought down by the onward avalanche of orange and black forward, however, caused by Princeton's overeagerness to get into the scrimmage, cost her a five yard penalty and forced McCormick to kick off once again. The paleface fullback, wrote a witness of the incident, "booted the pigskin once more to Carlisle's five yard mark, where the ever alert Mount Pleasant picked it up and trekked through the onrushing Tigers like water through a man's fingers. On he sped for twenty yards, placing the spheroid on his own twenty-five yard line division."

Later in the game McCormick showed his great line bucking ability by driving slam bang through the tottering Indian line to midfield for a gain of twenty yards.

THE PIN PIANO.

An Amusing Musical Instrument That is Easily Made.

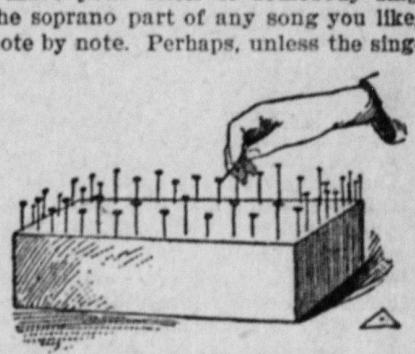
Have you a cigar box, a bit of tissue paper, a paper of pins and a tack hammer? Well, that is all you need to make a pinnetta, and I am sure the pleasure and amusement it will afford you and your friends will amply repay you for the trouble.

First, you take the box and nail down the lid, then cover the whole box with bright colored paper, so that it will look pretty. Then tack the pins along the edges of the bottom of the box. You must be very careful in the pounding of the pins, for this is the difficult part of the work.

Have your sister or somebody sing the soprano part of any song you like, note by note. Perhaps, unless the singer has a perfectly true voice, you had better use some instrument to tune your pinnetta by. Use new straight pins and pound them in until they sound exactly like the singing, just as a violin is tuned with a piano. The deeper the pins are driven the higher the sound. If a very high note is desired small black pins are best, and for bass notes large needles are best, but common pins can be used for all. A very little difference in the depth of the driving makes a great difference in the sound.

ABOUT THE SUN DOG.

Explanation of the Cause of These Bright Lights in the Sky.

Did you ever see a sun dog? Perhaps you do not know what a sun dog is. The scientific name for it is parheliac, which means "near the sun," from the Greek words para and helios. You have seen a halo around the moon quite often no doubt and sometimes one around the sun. A halo is caused by the refraction and dispersion of the rays of light by the ice crystals floating in the upper atmosphere. The crystals act as prisms, breaking the light into the colors of the rainbow. It sometimes happens that the refracted rays are intensified at certain points in the halo, perhaps because there are more crystals at those points, and these spots are often dazzlingly bright. It is a spot of that kind that is called a parheliac, or more familiarly a sun dog, because it is near the sun as a dog is near or follows its master. When the sun gets high in the heavens the parheliac gradually separates from the halo and appears as a brilliant spot of light. So far as the editor knows there is no separation of that kind in the moon's halo, perhaps because the moon's light is so much fainter than that of the sun. The editor had the great pleasure of seeing a sun dog several years ago, and it was beautiful beyond description.—Chicago News.

Lions and Tigers.

A curious story as illustrating the difference in courage between a lion and a Bengal tiger is told by an old showman: "One day, in order to make a test, we placed a firecracker in the respective cages and lighted the fuses. As soon as they began to burn they attracted the attention of both animals, but in a widely different manner. The lion withdrew into a corner and watched the proceedings with a distrustful and uneasy eye. The tiger, on the contrary, advanced to the burning fuse with a firm step and unflinching gaze. On reaching the cracker he took his paw and began to roll it over the floor, and when it exploded beneath his very nose he did not flinch, but continued his examination until perfectly satisfied. The lion betrayed great fear when he heard the report of the explosion and for quite a time could not be coaxed out of his den."

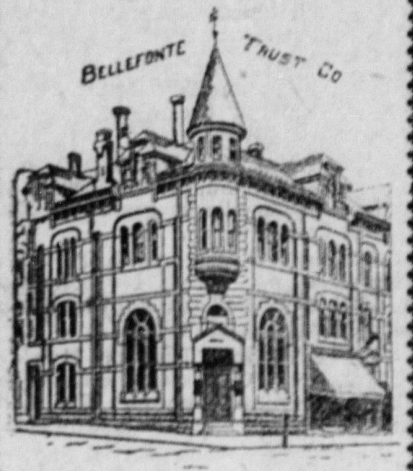
