ABOUT THE SUN DOG.

Explanation of the Cause of These Bright Lights In the Sky.

Did you ever see a sun dog? Perhaps you do not know what a sun deg The scientific name for it is parhelion, which means "near the sun; from the Greek words para and hellos. You have seen a halo around the moon quite often no doubt and sometimes one around the sun. A halo is caused by the refraction and dispersion of the rays of light by the ice crystals floating in the upper atmosphere. The crystals act as prisms, breaking the light into the colors of the rainbow. It sometimes happens that the refracted rays are intensified at certain points in the halo, perhaps because there are more crystals at those points, and these spots are often dazzlingly bright. It is a spot of that kind that is called a parhelion, or more familiarly a sun dog, because it is near the sun as a dog is near or follows its master. When the sun gets high in the heavens the parhelion gradually separates from the halo and appears as a brilliant spot of light. So far as the editor knows there is no separation of that kind in the moon's halo, perhaps because the moon's light is so much fainter than that of the sun. The editor had the great pleasure of seeing a sun dog several years ago, and it was beautiful beyond description.-Chicago News.

A curious story as illustrating the difference in courage between a lion and a Bengal tiger is told by an old showman: "One day, in order to make a test, we placed a firecracker in the respective cages and lighted the fuses. As soon as they began to burn they attracted the attention of both animals. but in a widely different manner. The lion withdrew into a corner and watched the proceedings with a distrusted and uneasy eye. The tiger, on the contrary, advanced to the burning fuse with a firm step and unflinching gaze.
