Bronze Statue of Major Thomas' Latest Work of Famous Sculptress. A beautiful bronze statue of Major

John W. Thomas, subscribed by the employees of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railroad, of which he was president, has been executed by Miss Enid Yandell, the greatest American woman sculptor.

Miss Yandell is one of the three woman sculptors of America to receive a decoration from the French government and is the only woman member of the National Sculpture Society of America


