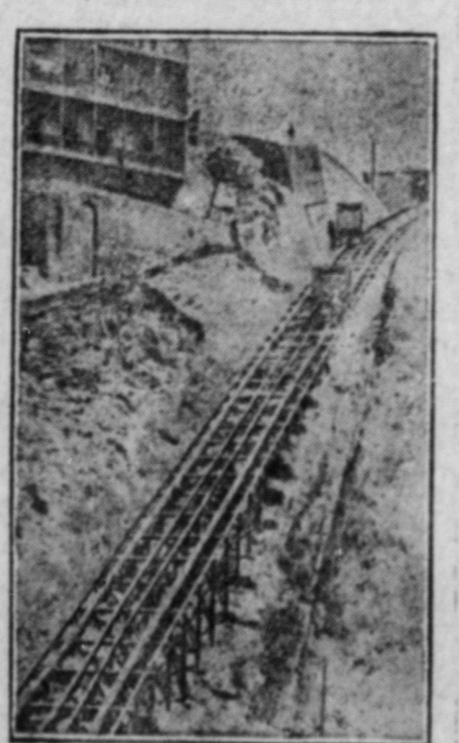


PRESIDENT MONTT OF CHILE AND A STREET SCENE IN VALPARAISO.

SINGER AND MOTHER.

Mme. Schumann-Heink Loves Her Art and Her Big Family Too.

One of the notable incidents of the musical season in New York has been the return to the operatic stage at the Manhattan Opera House of the great German contralto, Mme. Ernestine Schumann-Heink. She declared that it was a welcome change for her after the fatigue of a concert tour. She is a singer of remarkable endurance and at the time of her appearance on the stage of the Manhattan Opera House had already sung in sixty-three concerts this season and had nearly as many more engagements of that kind to fill.

"It is no wonder that I remember Azucena. I have sung the part more than 300 times in Germany. In Germany I have sung practically all the low voice roles. I have never tried to sing soprano parts and ruin my voice, although I can easily reach high C. I have appeared in 'Carmen' many times. I can do that no more. People would laugh. They would say, 'That Carmen is the mother of eight children.'"

She herself laughed heartily at the thought. "Now," she continued, "my favorite role is Erda, for Erda is the world mother."

The great contralto is much pleased because two of her eight children are going to develop splendid bass voices. These are her sons Henry and Hans, at present studying in Chicago. Speaking of their talents, the proud mother said: "They will both be singing in opera before I myself have finished. Isn't it marvelous? I am so happy about it. All my life I have worked hard, but at last I have arrived at my goal. I have a home for my family, and I am thoroughly happy. And I think that it has made my voice deeper and more settled—the knowledge that I myself am settled at last."

It was over these sons that there was a now celebrated controversy between the American state department and the German authorities. They were detained by the German government on the ground of their being liable to military service when the singer attempted to assemble her family about her in the United States. She succeeded at last not only in bringing them to this country, but in obtaining

Schumann-Heink bowed and smiled. "Ach, Gott, my dear," she said in her broken English, "I hope we shall meet before that!"
