STEELE—A little eleven months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Steele, of Bellefonte, died on the 11th. It was ill for a month with catarrhus affections. The funeral took place Friday.

Mrs. SARAH E. REED—widow of G. L. Reed, died at the Reed homestead, in Clearfield, on Monday night of last week in her 82nd year. Deceased was born near Bellefonte and her maiden name was Powell. She was a resident of Clearfield for about sixty years. Four sons and two daughters survive her.

JOHN HULL—who recently moved from the Harshberger farm, near Milesburg, to the Brockerhoff farm near Fillmore, died suddenly, on Sunday in the corn crib. Heart failure is said to be the trouble. He was about 46 years of age and is survived by a wife and several children. He is also survived by an aged mother, Mrs. James Hull, of Milesburg, and a sister, Mrs. Samuel Stover, of Spring Mills.

He had been ill and under operation performed with the hope of saving his life, but without avail. Deceased is survived by his wife, two daughters, one son, four brothers and three sisters. Funeral services were conducted in the Disciple church at Blanchard by Rev. Patterson. Interment was made in the Romola cemetery.

REV. LUTHER A. Miller, a former pastor, conducting the services, interment was made in the Owen cemetery.

Mrs. ANNIE M. WOLF—widow of William Wolf, of Centre Hall, died on Saturday last at the home of her son, Wm. Witmer, at Ardmore, Pa., near Philadelphia, after an illness of several months. She was a daughter of Henry Witmer, deceased, and was married to William Wolf in 1854. Her age was 80 years. Her son, Wm. Witmer, with whom she had her home since the death of her husband, survives, also two grand children, a son and daughter of the latter, also a sister Mrs. Isaac Smith of Centre Hall.
