Messrs. John Roush and Ralph Shook, of Pennsylvania, were seen in our vicinity on Sunday.

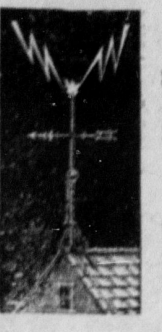
