Counts von Moltke and von Bernstorff, Respectively New Danish Minister and German Ambassador to Washington.

Dr. Rachel S. Skidelsky, Who Advocates Smoking For Women - Navy Deserter Magness, Whose Wife Seeks His Release.

GERMANY'S new ambassador to the United States, Count Johann Heinrich von Bernstorff, like his late predecessor, Speck von Sternburg, intimate personal friend of President Roosevelt, married an American girl, Miss Jeanne Luckemeyer, daughter of Edward Luckemeyer of New York, was wedded to Count von Bernstorff in 1887. They have a son, Christian, and a daughter, Alexandra.

The new ambassador began his diplomatic career in 1890, when he was made attaché at Constantinople, whence his advance has been made from one grade to another till lately he has been assigned to Egypt, where he first was diplomatic agent, then consul general at Cairo and finally early this year was raised to the rank of minister plenipotentiary.

Count von Bernstorff is the fourth son of Count Albrecht von Bernstorff

a distinguished contemporary of Bismarck, and was born in London while his father was German ambassador to the court of St. James.

While in England the count came especially under the notice of Emperor William as a result of his work in ameliorating the existing ill feeling against Germany.

The Kaiser's new ambassador to the United States is a man above middle height, of slight figure and wears a blond mustache. His knowledge of English is well high perfect, and he is known as a successful after dinner speaker and a witty conversationalist. It is not probable that Count von Bernstorff will be able to arrange his affairs at Cairo to arrive in Washington before the end of the year.

Dr. Rachel S. Skidelsky, one of the best known practitioners of Philadelphia and a member of the County Medical society, after starting the Women's club recently by defending the tobacco habit among men, started it still more by advocating the use of cigarettes by women. Many physicians hold similar views, Dr. Skidelsky said, but hesitate to advise their women patients to smoke because of a fear that what was offered as medicine might become habitual indulgence.

Dr. Skidelsky was born in Russia, but has lived in this country for thirty-nine years and has a large practice. "I feel sure," she said, "that tobacco if pure and properly used might be beneficial to women. I think that if a woman would sit down for five minutes before beginning her day and give the time to a cigarette she would be able to plan better the day's work, and five minutes thus used three times daily would be, I think, of much benefit to her. I would, of course, recommend the practice only to such as were in no danger of becoming addicted to the more extended use of cigarettes."

Much sympathy has been expressed among the friends of the late Senator Arthur Pue Gorman of Maryland for his daughter Ada, who in marrying Charles Joseph Magness, alias Hartlove, brought upon herself a remarkable succession of troubles. The marriage took place unknown to the friends and relatives of the bride, and not long afterward it became known that Magness had deserted from the United States navy. His arrest as a deserter a short time ago brought to light the facts of the marriage. He is now spending his honeymoon in the brig of the United States receiving ship Lancaster in the League Island navy yard, Philadelphia, while his wife is using all the influence in her power to secure his release.
