The Telephone. Professor Alexander Graham Bell is reported to have explained in a lecture how he came to invent the telephone as follows:

"My father invented a symbol by which deaf mutes could converse, and finally I invented an apparatus by which the vibrations of speech could be seen, and it turned out to be a telephone.

"I arrived at the conclusion that if I could make iron vibrate on a dead man's ear I could make an instrument more delicate which would cause those vibrations to be heard and understood.

"The telephone arose from my attempts to teach the deaf to speak. It arose from my knowledge, not of electricity, but as a teacher of the deaf.

Cocoonuts Make Good Fuel.

"Mine is rather a curious business," said a man who owns a small saw-house and shed down near London's docks.

"I buy thousands of cocoonut shells from stall keepers all over London, from confectioners, from cocoonut oil extractors, from market sweepers and others.
