Coroner Huff was summoned and a jury empaneled of the following men: Sheriff Cronister, George Campbell, I. T. Davis, Charles Wilson, Irvin Gray, and Charles Boyer Jr. After examining the body carefully, verdict was rendered that death was caused by falling from a train. His arm, leg and back were broken, also a deep cut on his head. The body was photographed by Tallhelm, and his picture sent to chief clerk of Altoona, and the body will be held until poor directors see if his relatives can be found.
